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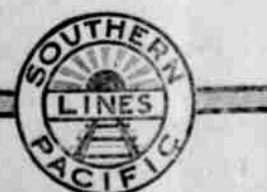
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## FAMED INDIAN CHIEFS "HIT THE SAWDUST TRAIL"



ST. PAUL, Minn., June 5.—A small band of five full-blood Blackfoot Indians of the Glacier National Park reservation, Montana, recently created a stir in the Indian world by "hitting the sawdust trail." These former parans—Chief Two Guns White Wolf, famed throughout the United States

as the model for the buffalo nickel; Split Ears and Eagle Child—were converted and joined the Methodist church Sunday, April 22. Rev. Henry C. Mecklenburg, pastor of the Piegian Indian mission on the Glacier Park reservation, converted the red men and gave them their start on the

"straight and narrow trail." They now are chanting hymns to the pounding of their tom toms and are going about the reservation as a band of Christian soldiers seeking more converts among their "feathered" tribesmen.

the robbery. He did not take time to buy the silver, and after daylight took the officers to the place where he had dumped it out upon the ground. The large packet of bills was found in his knapsack.

That he is quite familiar with the section of the county in which he committed the crime is shown by his own action. He also knows the officers and immediately upon his arrest began calling Officer Hopkins "Frank" and "Two-Gun." He also inquired about Sheriff Starmer and wanted to know where he was.

Upon reaching Roseburg he was placed in the county jail. Larsen talked freely to reporters and those who gathered to converse with him. He appeared to enjoy the notoriety which his act has caused. He said that he has a long prison term ahead of him and on several occasions mentioned the fact himself.

"It wasn't worth the chance," he said at one time. "I figured I would get at least three or four thousand dollars, out of the haul, and when I saw that big roll of bills I thought that it was worth the risk I had run, but when I counted it over and saw all those little bills it took the heart out of me and I wanted to go back after the silver. It certainly wasn't worth the chance I took."

Larsen willingly posed for a photograph and joked with the officers and reporters. He is a clean looking young chap not at all what one would expect of a man who would commit such a crime. He gives his age as 21 years, although he looks a little older than that age. He is pleasant and good natured and not a "hard" looking man.

He very carefully avoids all reference to his past life, beyond a few months back, and when pinned down laughingly remarks that "that's personal." He says that he quit school "somewhere" in the sixth grade and for several years has been working in various lumber camps. He says he has been through Glendale several times before and has been in Roseburg a few times. He maintains that he did not intend to rob the bank upon going to Glendale, but went there for the purpose of going "prospecting." He says he has had considerable experience in this work and insists that his purpose in Glendale was to hunt for mineral deposits.

He says that he is glad he didn't kill anyone in the commission of the crime. He would have shot to kill, he said, if he could have escaped by doing so, but would do so only as a last resort. In Glendale, he says he was careful to shoot over the heads of the people and not to aim at any one. The officers believe that he is desperate and bold enough to do anything and so no chances will be taken with him. At Glendale he endeavored to find some way to escape from jail and possibly would have done so if it had not been for the guard who was kept over him. It is expected that he will attempt a break from the Roseburg jail and every effort will be made to prevent his escape.

Larsen was arraigned before Justice of the Peace George Jones this afternoon and waived preliminary examination, and was bound over to the grand jury. It is expected that a criminal session of the grand jury will be called as soon as Judge Hamilton returns from Portland where he was called to hold court.

## SCOUTS GO TO SUTHERLIN

About thirty-five boy scouts went from Roseburg to Sutherlin last night for the purpose of interesting boys of that city in the formation of a scout troop. The scout orchestra played

several selections, after which Scoutmaster Lintott talked for a short time on scouting. Four boys enlisted for a troop there and it is expected that enough to form a troop will be signed up by Friday. A scoutmaster and troop committee have already been selected.

## DEITY STANDS FOR JUSTICE

Chinese God Long Highly Venerated for Mission Which It Is Supposed to Have.

A god, said to be 300 years old, which has changed its place of residence on a number of occasions and still retains its original dignity and appearance, attracts the attention of persons who attend the sessions of the Mixed Court in Shanghai, China. About twenty years ago the god was transferred to his present position from the Nanking Road temple. He is known as the Tu De Shun (the God of Earth) and is guarded by nine smaller images.

In the olden times the yamen runners took the place of the present-day court officials and detectives. It was their duty to serve warrants and summonses as well as to arrest robbers, murderers and criminals. Before they went out on their mission, they were sure to prostrate themselves before Tu De Shun and ask for his blessing and aid in securing success. Whenever they succeeded in their missions and returned to the yamen they offered their thanks.

Tu De Shun sits facing the courtrooms, because, it is said, he wishes to see justice properly meted out. He will frown whenever there is an injustice done to anybody. Litigants make their offerings to the god and may be seen at various times asking Tu De Shun to give them the power to win the lawsuits in which they are involved. When a magistrate assumed office in the olden days he always prayed to this god for assistance before he dared take over the office.

## RED MEN AS WOOD CARVERS

Many of the American Aborigines Were Experts, as Specimens Still in Existence Show.

It has been pointed out that the chief reminder of our aboriginal life is the woodwork and bone carving of the Indians of the Pacific Northwest. While the cities of that region are enterprising and important centers of industry, and while the inhabitants of many Indian reservations have adopted the latest farming methods and have become prosperous agriculturists, there remain some primitive workers whose wooden products have the same quaint appearance as those of their ancestors generations and generations ago.

When they possessed no better tools than stone axes and bone handled implements, before the white man had brought his iron instruments to this country, these Indians were experts at their chosen profession. With their crude implements they cut planks four feet wide by ten feet long from a tree. Many specimens of their carving in wood, bone and ivory, preserved now in museums, show considerable skill. Their canoes, hewn from a single log, were 50 feet in length, as a rule, and caused great astonishment among the first Europeans that came to this country.

## Use of Blotting Paper.

According to the Encyclopedia Britannica, blotting paper is of early date, being mentioned under the date 1465. It was a coarse, gray, unsized paper, fragments of which have been found among the leaves of fifteenth century accounts where it had been left after being used for blotting. Early in the sixteenth century blotting paper must have been in ordinary use, for it is referred to in W. Horman's "Vulgaria" (dated 1519) as follows: "Blotting paper serveth to dry wet writing, lest there be made blots or burrs." The same authority states it is remarkable that, in spite of the comparatively early date of this invention, and continued generally in use, and even at the present day continues in several countries in fairly common use as an ink absorbent. There appears to be no record as to who first used blotters.
