HANDLING WORDAGE FOR DEMPSEY FIGHT

SHELBY, Mont., June 5.—Handling the wordage of a championship fight requires more ticks than a clock.

The Great Northern railroad working with the Western Union in Shelby July Fourth will tick the color and the results of the Dempsey-Gibbons fight to the world outside. It will make more than a million ticks.

The results will be ticks on who wins.

The color will be ticks on how he did it.

There will be 15 sending tickers at the ringside.

At this fight there will be no such thing as a private wire.

J. C. Rankine, superintendent of Telegraph of the Great Northern, would like to give every newspaper writer a separate wire.

But this is Shelby and not Toledo or Jersey City.

Writers will be grouped around the tickers sending their general direction.

For instance the scribes sending vast will be grouped on one side of the ring. Those firing their impressions west on how Dempsey smacks Gibbons and how Gibbons rams Dempsey will be grouped on another side of the square circle and so on.

Copy will be filed in ticks. Clerks provided by the Western Union will feed the stuff to the operators quickly and without confusion.

Superintendent Rankine believes that close to a million words will be handled by his staff.

The major dome wire associations will probably look on to the telephone lines. There are accommodations for four outlets this way. It is possible that additional wires may be strung by the phone company from Conrad to double the present capacity.

The Great Northern already has one observation car parked here and equipped as a first class telephone office. By June 15 another will be brought here and fitted up.

Railway officials are planning to park 32 special trains here on newly built spurs.

The five trains expected from Canada will be stopped at Varden, a mile and a half east of Shelby.

The Great Northern will establish a regular hotel camp here to house and feed its extra employees needed for the overnight big city terminal.

It is possible that some of the visiting newspapermen will be housed in pullmans. Between 500 and 400 scribes are expected to be here to tell what happens.

The railroad is working with promoters Mike Collins, Loy J. Molmby and Mayor Jim Johnson. In every respect to make the show a big success.

Railway officials estimate they will haul 25,000 to Shelby by rail July 4th.

Fans who travel by auto should number around 20,000 more.

The arena, built to seat 40,268, is nearly one-half complete. The promoters are already figuring on plans to boost the capacity of the Octagon to 60,000 if the advance sale looks healthy enough.

There are 1,200,000 feet of lumber being used in the bowl. A sellout will make the gate 1,200,000—a dollar for every foot of lumber used.

NINETEEN GUARD UNITS CLAIM CUP

SALEM, June 5.—Nineteen Oregon guard companies are laying claim to the silver trophy cup offered by Adjutant General White to the first guard unit to complete mobilization in the recent surprise mobilization. All 19 reported for duty with all officers and 60 per cent of their equipped strength under arms at 6 o'clock the night of the recent emergency test, this being the hour named at which men were required to begin reporting at the armories.

Just how to divide the trophy among the 19 claimants is the question which is puzzling White. A board of officers to whom this test was assigned succeeded in eliminating ten of the claimants on various technicalities but nine others remain.

CRATER LAKE PARK RULES PUBLISHED

GRANTS PASS, June 5.—The department of the interior is distributing a pamphlet entitled "Rules and Regulations Crater Lake National Park, Oregon, 1923." Fifteen of the twenty pages of printed matter is descriptive and informative. An important reminder is that about 40 per cent more gasoline per mile is required, due to the altitude of about 6000 feet on the rim road and its approaches to the park. The elevation requires also one shift lower of the gears on motor cars.

Dogs and cats are not permitted in the park, although a dog may be taken through by tying him up while in the park limits. Wild animals must not be molested in any way, unless in the act of menacing life or limb. As regards fishing, five is the limit that may be taken from the lake for a day's catch, and 20 from waters in the park. One of the recent rules bars the location of mining claims within the park limits.

The wild flowers found in the park are listed and described by Albert R. Sweetser, professor of botany, University of Oregon.
