REEDSPORT MAN PLACED IN JAIL

Attack Upon Fifteen Year Old Girl is Charged Against George Grant—Hills Short Being Sought On Similar Charge.

George S. Grant, aged 42 years, was brought to Roseburg this afternoon by Sheriff S. W. Sturmer, and Deputy Sheriff W. G. Grube, of Reedport, charged with an attack on 15-year old June Thomas, daughter of A. D. Thomas, a painter and decorator at Reedport. Hills Short, who a short time ago was arrested and imprisoned on a booze charge, is also being sought upon a similar charge. Short is in hiding and officers have been unable to get any trace of him, although a search is being made. It is expected, however, that he will soon be located.

Grant's crime is alleged to have occurred on May 15, while Short, it is claimed, attacked the girl last Sunday. Miss Agnes Pitchford, county juvenile officer, has investigated the case, and will bring the girl to Roseburg.

Grant is being held for the grand jury, his bonds being fixed in the sum of \$5000.

It is stated that feeling at Reedport is quite intense over the crime and that there was considerable talk of violence. The officers kept the prisoner well guarded to prevent his being molested.
