

2ND DIVISION IN N. Y. TODAY FOR ANNUAL MEET

Officers and Enlisted Men Who Halted Onslaught of Germans Assemble

DIVISION HEADS ATTEND

Gen. "Black Jack" Pershing, Secretary Weeks and Secretary Denby Expected

NEW YORK, June 7.—The generals and colonels and lesser officers, the top klickers and mere buck privates, who, as members of the Second Division, halted the German rush to Paris, in 1918, and fought the last of the Teuton divisions to a standstill at Chateau Thierry, at St. Mihiel, at Soissons and in the Argonne met here today for the fifth annual reunion and frolic of the Second Division Association. All rank and distinction were forgotten as the twenty-five hundred men from virtually every state in the union, assembled to renew old acquaintances and repeat old feats of the division. The cranking, the jangling, the kidding of the days of the division in France were renewed as small groups gathered to tell of the push in Champagne or the historic battle at Belleau Wood, where the Marines of the division showed the true worth of the American fighting forces. It was the stand of the Americans at Belleau Wood, which caused the French General Degoutte to issue a general order in June, 1918, declaring that Belleau Wood should thereafter be called the "Bois de la Brigade de Marines."

Division Heads Here
Two of the three division commanders were present—Major General John A. Lejeune, who led the division from July, 1918, to the final days of the war, and Major General James C. Harbord, who commanded the troops in the Soissons. Major-General Omar Bundy, who led the division in the early stages of the war, could not attend, as he is stationed in the Philippines.

General John J. Pershing, Secretary of War Weeks, Secretary of the Navy Denby, Assistant Secretary Theodore Roosevelt, Admiral Plunkett and other officials are expected to be present during the three days the reunion will be in progress. One of the more prominent of the division's heroes—First Sergeant Dan Daly, attached to a machine gun company and holder of practically every decoration this government bestows, as well as foreign decorations—was the center of a group of grinning admirers, who insisted on daily telling of his numerous heroisms.

Touch Of Pathos
While a spirit of gaiety pervaded the meeting, a somber touch was given by the presence of a group of disabled members of the division and a number of gold-star mothers. The fame of the Second Division as the flower of France was brought with 24,419 casualties—dead, wounded, missing and prisoners—the greatest number of casualties suffered by any American division. For the thousands of dead in France, a special prayer and a eulogy were offered this afternoon by the Reverend Jason Noble Pierce, of Washington.

The members of the division were not recruited from one particular section, but from all over the nation. The committee, attempting to bring the members together, faced a herculean task, but the response was more satisfactory than expected.

FASHIONS IN HORSES' TAILS

Odd Designs That Have Been More or Less Popular at Various Periods of History.

Horses' tails have been subjected to curious changes of fashion. In the time of the Stuarts the English coach horse's tail was worn long and flowing, and was cut square. It was adorned with ribbons on gala days, and strapped up in a leather case in winter weather; thus a certain harmony was preserved between the wig of the master and the tail of his horse.

By the time of George II a short wig and a pistol had taken the place of the flowing curls in which the cavaliers of Charles I and the rakes of Charles II's court delighted.

The brilliant idea occurred to Lord Cadogan, a cavalry officer of that period, to reduce the tails of his dragon horses to a short dock. Possibly this was done with the view of saving his soldiers the trouble of cleaning these long tails and avoiding the nuisance of the splashes and mud from such hair streamers. Or it may be that the debased taste of the age made him think the appearance of his regiment was really improved by bobbed tails. That is a question which history does not decide.

The next step was to turn bobtail into plaittail by cutting all the hair from the last two or three inches of the dock. Having thus succeeded in disfiguring the hindquarters of dragon horses, some individual devised the additional barbarity of cropping their ears.

CATCHING FISH WITH POISON

Natives of Borneo Have Peculiar Method of Laying Toss on the Finny Tribe.

Along the tributary streams of the Rejang river, in the independent state of Sarawak, on the island of Borneo, the native Sedowans and Dyaks have a unique method of taking fish, and one much superior to dynamiting. Near the mouth of a creek a barrier of latticework is erected. In this space is left an opening wide enough to permit the canoes to pass through. After the boats go up the stream a net is placed across the opening. From 20 to 30 canoes engage in fishing. When the point is reached where operations are to begin, two small dugouts, which have been towed, are emptied of their liquid contents. This muddy-looking concoction is tuba poison, from the plant coculus indicus. The poison is made by pounding the root to shreds and then mixing with water in certain proportions known to the fishermen. Quick results are obtained. In about five minutes stupefied fish begin coming to the surface gasping for breath. The numbers increase with every passing minute. Standing up in their canoes the natives spear the helpless fish with great rapidity. In half an hour the boats are generally filled to capacity. How potent the tuba poison is may be realized by the fact that within half an hour after a few gallons have been poured in a good-sized creek, fish a mile and a half downstream are brought to the surface in considerable numbers. Where the tuba poison method is good is that the poison does not kill the fish—only stupefies them temporarily. Thus all not taken for food soon are normal again.

ODD MATERIAL FOR SCULPTOR

How Canova, One of the World's Great Masters, Started on the Road to Fame.

Antonio Canova, famous Venetian sculptor, first attracted attention by modeling a lion in butter. When nine years old he was placed in the household of a nobleman. His grandfather, a stonemason, had taught him the rudiments of carving.

One day the nobleman was giving a state dinner. The chief ornament for the table failed to arrive. The host was in despair. The boy set to work on a huge piece of butter and when the nobleman beheld a molded lion he was well pleased. The result was that Antonio was sent to take lessons in sculpture.

For four years he worked at his art in a cell underneath a monastery. At last he produced a statue which sent the art critics wondering. The Venetian senate sent him to Rome to study when he was twenty-three years old.

He hit upon a new and daring style and for a time every one in Rome scorned it. He worked for 20 years in extreme poverty but at last his work came to be recognized as that of a master.

Garibaldi's Love of Animals.

George Macaulay Trevelyan, author of an old book about the Italian patriot, tells this story about his love of animals:

"The tenderest of the brave, he took thought not only for men and women, but for the joys and sufferings of animals. Ever since the day when, as a child, he had cried over the wounded grasshopper, he was brother to every living thing. He could not endure that a bird should be caged, nor allow an animal to be struck in his presence. It pained him even to see flowers plucked, or a bough wantonly broken.

"During his dictatorship in Naples, in 1860, he spent, in trying to remedy the condition of the cab-horses, much time which others thought he should have given to tasks of government in time of crisis; and in the following year, when he was the most famous man in Europe, he thought it natural to go out at night in the rain to seek a strayed lamb among the rocks and brushwood of Caprea."

Dampness Harms a Piano.

Most people know that a piano should never stand in a draught; but it is not always possible to place the instrument in an ideal position. A piano is frequently regarded as a piece of furniture, instead of a somewhat delicate arrangement of fine wire and hammers which are very susceptible to changes of temperature. Damp is the greatest enemy that confronts the piano, but if the lid is raised frequently and allowed to remain open for a time a current of air can circulate inside. Damp also causes the hammers to swell, which, in turn, makes the keys hard to depress. It is never advisable to have a valuable piano in a cold room in winter for more than a day or two at a time; and if possible a small oil stove should be placed near to it for an hour or so each day, if it is not desirable to light a fire occasionally.

Specifications for Biological Glass.

The bureau of standards in collecting information from the army, navy, the biological survey, the public health service, and manufacturers of biological products concerning the requirements of glass for this purpose and the desirability of preparing standard specifications covering the same. The bureau has already assisted manufacturers of biological products in obtaining glass suitable for their use, but the requests have indicated a possible value for more complete specifications.—Scientific American.

FLORIST JAILED ON BOOZE CHARGE

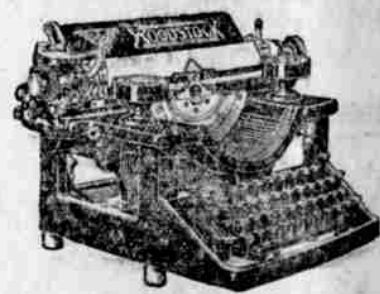
