KNIGHTS KAMELIA NEW KLAN ORDER

William Simmons Announces

ELK CONVENTION PLANS ARE MADE

Lodge at The Dalles Arranges
Fine Program for Three-
Day Gathering

SPORTS ARE SCHEDULED

Pony Express Race from Bend
to The Dalles, Over Old Emigrant Trail, Will Be One
of the Big Features

THE DALLES, June 6.—An elaborate and diversified three-day program of entertainment for which The Dalles Elks' lodge has been unmindful of expenditure is arranged for the pleasure of visitors from all sections of the state, who will attend the Elks' sixth annual state convention here June 21, 22 and 23. More than \$5000 will be spent for the entertainment of men, women and children.

One sporting event alone will cost better than \$1500.

The convention is being looked forward to with a great deal of anticipation by the people of The Dalles for the reason that a convention of this kind brings the biggest and cleanest in festivity.

It is felt that discretion guided the decision of Elksdom to hold the 1923 convention in this locality, especially at this time of the year. Nature in her wisdom is due to open the cornucopia of plenty. June, the rarest of all months, is responsive in blossoms and a riot of colors in this land, where rain and sunshine meet. World-famous cherries of Wasco county will be at their best for liberal distribution.

Most of the delegates will motor over the Columbia river highway, 35 miles of rugged and scenic grandeur. Others from Eastern Oregon will trek over the Old Oregon Trail, where their predecessors, Lewis and Clark, blazed the way to the site in The Dalles, where the third annual presentation of the Pageant of Wasco county will be given Thursday, the opening day of the convention. The Pageant of Wasco county, depicting the origin and early history of the Oregon territory, will be staged in a natural amphitheatre capable of holding 7000 people and is the place where Lewis and Clark made their first rude camp. Here in those days fought with hardship and danger, the actual scene of the arrival of Lewis and Clark will be re-enacted by men and women themselves descendants of the pioneers of the Inland Empire. The cast is composed of approximately 200 people, including tribes of neighboring Indians, whose topees will be spread near the parade grounds. The wild beat of their tom-toms will keep watch through the night, lending romantic atmosphere to the occasion.

Harking back to the days before steel was laid and steam engines puffed their way to the coast, another romance of the west, the Pony Express race will be held from Bend to The Dalles. A purse of \$1250 in gold coin will be presented to the winners of this thrilling race. Starting at ten minute intervals the riders will leave the Elks' home in Bend, beginning at 5 o'clock Friday morning, and will travel by way of Prineville over the old immigrant trail and will arrive before the Elks' temple in The Dalles between the hours of 6 and 8, Friday evening.

Eight relays will be made. The best horseflesh of the Northwest has been entered in this race, one of the most emotional known to man.

As a contrast to the historical events, a more modern and less hazardous type of entertainment will be given to those of the sport-lik in 20 rounds of fast and furious boxing. Heading one of the best fighting cards ever lined up in The Dalles, two clean boys, Frankie Grandetta

of Spokane and Able Gordon of Portland will wipe the question off the slate. In Portland recently these boys met in one of the most hotly contested battles ever viewed by Portland fans. The result of this fight was that Grandetta won the decision with just a shade to favor Gordon, acknowledged one of the most formidable light feather weight fistic artists on the coast, has the confidence backing of his followers that he is as good in the ring as his shifty opponent. Veterans Pete Mitchell, who has weathered many a storm of gloves will meet "Myatona" Eddie Smith, Jr. of Portland in six cantos. Other rising talent is being lined up to fill out the card.

The elaborate fire works costing over \$1000 will be the feature of the closing night of the convention. Beginning at dusk, the sky will be lighted for miles around by the most brilliant combination of flaming colors ever created by the ingenuity of man.

The mammoth Elk's parade, stretching over a mile in length, with bands and floats and Elks in attractive regalia, will march through the streets of the city Saturday evening before the opening of the fireworks display. The 19 different Elks' lodges in the state will be represented in this parade, probably the longest ever seen in The Dalles. Floats, bands, fire and drum corps and comely features will be included in the great march of the Elks.

At least five well known state bands will produce music during the three-day convention days. The famous Elks' band of Portland, with over 60 pieces, will be on the job to scatter over the city. The McMinville band, known over the state for its organization and harmony will not be in the background when the music begins.

Special pictures have been obtained for the moving picture houses for those who find enjoyment on the silver screen.

The ladies will not be overlooked. Golf parties at the county club, motor trips over the beautiful avenues leading out of The Dalles and a dozen varieties of enjoyment have been provided for Mrs. Bill, when she loses her husband in the riot and shuffle of things.

Ritualistic work and business sessions of the different lodges will be held in the local Elks' temple.

The housing problem is being handled by competent men, who have stated that at least 4000 visitors can be conveniently accommodated.

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TICKETS FOR FIGHT ARE BEING MAILED

SHELBY, Mont., June 6.—Tickets for the Dempsey-Gibbons fight, July Fourth, have arrived here and will be broadcasted immediately to all agencies that are handling them from Coast to Coast and Canada.

The prices are \$50, \$40, \$30, \$25, and \$20, plus 10 per cent government tax.

The \$20.00 seats are general admission and will be sold only at the arena the day of the fight. They are not reserved.

There are 32 special trains being organized to bring fight fans to the arena.

Trains are coming from Galveston, Fort Worth, Salt Lake City, Oakland, Cincinnati, Los Angeles, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Spokane, Tacoma, Omaha, Portland, Seattle, Chicago, Denver, Tulsa, Peoria, Butte, Casper, (Wyo.) and other points.

Canadian cities have plans to send five specials.

These are all pullman trains, equipped with diners; each train will have accommodations for 250 people.

These do not include the day trains that will come from closer points.

Shelby is doing a big tent and blanket business.

The Army and Navy store here has sold 1,800 tents and 6,000 blankets in the last few weeks.

The tourist camp—an 80 acre tract which is the largest tourist camp in the world—is being equipped for the motor parties. The lots are not equipped with tents, but have heat, light and water accommodations.

The arena is nearly one-half completed. It will seat 40,208.

Arrangements are being made to increase it to 60,000 if the advance sale indicates a sellout.

Orders are pouring in from all over the country.

The advance sale, including cash and reservations, is around 400,000.

COURT RULING SAID TO BE IMPORTANT

OLYMPIA, Wn., June 6.—The labor organizations of Washington are facing the most sweeping anti-union decision handed down by the supreme court since the 1918 anti-picketing rule. The court late yesterday held that when persons or firms not participating in industrial disputes suffer damages by reason of strikes they may sue the labor unions and the officers taking part in the strikes. The case grew out of the printers' strike for a 44-hour week.
