THREE MEN ATTEMPT HOLD-UP IN CANYON

Five Shots Fired at Traveling Salesman Who Refuses to Obey Order to Halt—Tourist Group Cars.

Five shots were fired by three highwaymen who last night attempted to halt a traveling salesman who was on the road between Canyonville and Glendale. The auto driver sensing a holdup, stepped on the gas and drove his car by the trio at a high rate of speed, and the outlaws in firing upon the machine failed to do any damage.

The man, whose name was not ascertained, was travelling towards Glendale at about 9 o'clock in the evening when the three men stepped into the road and flashed menacing revolvers. Without loss of time he gave the car more gas and it plucked up quickly and plunged at the highwaymen who dodged out of the way. As the driver of the machine tore by they began shooting and five shots were heard.

The salesman stopped at the J. B. Hart store near the Johns ranch and word was telephoned from there to Deputy Sheriff Branham who got in touch with "Two Gun" Hopkins at Canyonville. The two officers then closed in on the spot but the men evidently had taken to the brush and were not found. Several tourist cars which were just starting through the canyon, were grouped and went through together to give mutual aid in the event of further activities on the part of the highwaymen but they did not show themselves.

TWO SHIPS WRECKED ON ROCKY COAST

(By United Press.) SEATTLE, June 8.—Hidden rocks in the vicinity of Chirikof island, a hundred miles south of the Alaskan peninsula, claimed two more ships last night. The minesweeper Cardinal, crashed on a sunken reef was completely wrecked. The survey ship, Discovery, proceeding to the aid of the Cardinal also piled on the rocky coast. The crews of both vessels were taken off by the U. S. S. Cuyama. Approximately 125 men were aboard the two vessels. The Cardinal is a total loss.

(By Associated Press.) SEATTLE, June 8.—Officers and men of the naval mine sweeper, Cardinal, wrecked on the east coast of Chirikof island, south of the Alaskan peninsula, have been taken aboard the naval supply ship Cuyama, according to a radio message received here. A preliminary survey indicates that the Cardinal is a total loss.

Twelve Remain on Ship. (By Associated Press.) SEATTLE, June 8.—Twelve members of the crew of the mine sweeper Cardinal, wrecked on Chirikof island, remained aboard this morning, all others having gone ashore or having been taken off by the geodetic survey ship Discoverer. The captain was among those aboard the vessel, which was reported to be a total loss. The ship's stores are being salvaged.

Discovery Not Damaged. SEATTLE, June 8. (A. P.)—A message from the Geodetic survey ship, Discoverer, said the vessel "touched ground" while maneuvering about the wrecked Cardinal, but suffered no damage.

GERVAIS MAN SENT BACK TO ASYLUM

SALEM, June 8.—The startling career of Thomas Pfau of Gervais, which opened a few weeks ago when he grimly kicked his wife from bed because her alleged snoring disturbed his slumbers, closed with a kiss from the same wife in the court house corridors. He went his way to the asylum accompanied by some friends who seemed very anxious that he not leave them, while she went back to the farm at Gervais.

Pfau was in the asylum here back in 1920, his commitment then largely growing out of difficulties with his wife. He was later released, as his sanity seemed to be unquestioned after close observation by state hospital officials.

His retirement promised to be permanent until he was brought up again a few weeks ago on complaint of his wife that he had kicked her from bed. Dr. W. Carlton Smith, who examined him at that time, failed to find that such was a sign of insanity. But he did tell Pfau, and was ably seconded by Deputy District Attorney Page, that further demonstrations of a like character would result in a jail sentence.

The admonitions failed to have their desired effect, as shortly after he was back in court and the grand jury indicted him for assault and battery.

Pfau now hears spirits and things of like supernatural form and these hallucinations convinced Dr. W. H. Byrd that the man was insane. So instead of going ahead with the prosecution Pfau was sent to the asylum.

His wife had quite a talk with him in the corridor of the court house this morning. The conversation was carried on in Bohemian and Deputy Sheriff Burkhardt declined to interpret it. The conversation ended with a kiss and the deputy led Pfau away.
