COW TOWN OF SHELBY TAKES ON NEW LIFE

First Excitement Came Over Oil and Now Big Fight Has Oil Boom Eclipsed—People Living in Tents, Bunk Houses.

SHELBY, Mont., June 8.—The town is getting all dressed up for the big attraction. Host to the world on July 4, when Tom Gibbons will try to lift the heavyweight crown off Jack Dempsey's dome, this boom city is preparing feverishly for the big day. A year ago it was a somnolent cow town. The crops had been poor for several years, and the Great Northern railroad was ready to cut it off its list as a stopping place for its coast trains.

Then Gordon Campbell, up in the Sweetgrass arch, thirty miles north, found oil. That was in August of last year.

Campbell's find didn't raise any unusual excitement. Oil was a new thing for this section of the country, but when the news was broadcasted and outsiders began to pour in, the town awoke to its opportunities. Geologists, drillers, and those who always follow the lure of wealth, flocked to Shelby. It is the last stopping place for the oil fields.

Shelby got excited and the inhabitants have now forgotten about range cattle and crops. Their attention is centered on oil alone. Six months ago the town had a population of 1,000 and Mayor Jim Johnson had little to do except to work hard for the ten million dollar irrigation project he has been fostering. Now, there are 7,000 residents. Some of them live in tents others in bunkhouses. A few have pretentious dwellings.

The oil field rush was bad enough. When the big fight was finally signed for Shelby, the excitement became intense. In the last month, a hundred new structures have gone up from two-room shacks to two-story brick buildings.

The corner lunch stands gave way to better class cafes, and the cowboys from the range for the evening marveled at the change. No boom town ever came to the front as rapidly as Shelby is doing now.

Shelby, with saw and hammer, and mortar, is trying hard to get in shape for the big day. Night and day, the builders are at it. Those who come here July 4, will find ample accommodation for 3,000 cars. This is probably the last chance to see a bit of the old west, with its wild west features which still have an attraction for the city bred person, who will benefit by personal contact with these broadminded and cheerful people of the plains.

And, up-to-date—Say, a two-story stucco dance hall has just been completed, and christened the King Tut Frolie Palace. That's up to date stuff!

RODEO TO BE STAGED
SHELBY, Mont., June 8.—All the best riders of the west are training for the big rodeo to be held here in connection with the Dempsey-Gibbons fight. Promoters of the round-up say it will be the greatest ever attempted. The champion throwers and riders of Canada as well as those of this country have sent in their entries. The rodeo, starting on July 1st, will continue on July 6. A big stampede ground east of Shelby is now being constructed to seat 25,000. This is exclusive of the monster bowl going up to house the fight crowd.

"We'll see you in Shelby."

AUTHOR SAVES ALL REJECTION SLIPS

Successful Writer Presents Volume of Bound Rejection Blanks to University to Serve as Inspiration for Students.

EUGENE, June 8.—(Special).—While Ernest J. Haycox, University of Oregon senior who has won success in the short story field, may not have equalled the record of Roy Oetarius Cohen or Joseph Hergesheimer in failure to impress editors in the early days of their writing career, he accumulated a big batch of rejection slips before he began to get acceptances. Haycox kept them all, and now, on the eve of his graduation, he has made a bound booklet of them, with an introduction.

The booklet containing forty one formal notices and personal letters from editors, has been given by Haycox to Prof. W. F. G. Thacher, at the latter's request. Prof. Thacher says the booklet will be available to students in short story. It will serve to impress the student with the fact that there is no royal road to literary success. The writer who "lands" nine cases out of ten has to go through a period of "apprenticeship" before reward comes.

"A few brownings through this collection will forever abolish gun-shyness," wrote Haycox in the introduction to his booklet. "Therein is embodied that sweet swan song which every writer knows by heart: 'The editors thank you for your kindness in submitting "Passionate Potatoes," but regret that they have not found it adapted to the Mid-night Murmur. This in no way implies a lack of merit.'"

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"Let the collection grow. Let it be the proud boast of Oregon writers that they have actual, bona fide written rejections from every magazine in America. For, once having broken through and disposed of a yarn for cash, they can brag to the ceiling of the world about their early disappointments and likewise so forth."
