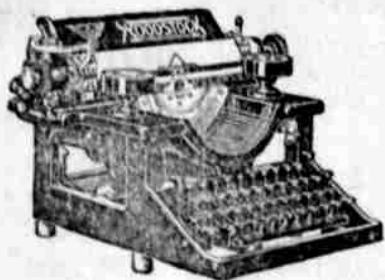

TILLER TO STAGE BIG CELEBRATION

Many Features to Be Staged in Big Two Day Celebration at Tiller, Oregon on 3rd and 4th of July; Crowd Anticipated.

Following up the custom set for many years Tiller, Oregon, will again be the scene of a big fourth of July celebration, when the fireworks are turned loose on the third and fourth of next month. Plans are being laid for one of the biggest and most exciting celebrations ever staged. According to announcement the two days will be crisscrossed with stunts and features such as will put the wild-west movie thrillers in the shade.

On Tuesday, July 3rd, things will open up with a big horse race and will run throughout the 2 days featuring such sports as foot racing, pole jumping, broad jumping, running high jump, horse-shoe pitching, high jump and one special feature not yet announced. A big pavilion will be the program extraordinary for each night. A good orchestra has been secured for these dances and a good time is promised.

A patriotic speech will be given by a well known speaker, whose name has not been announced yet and other patriotic numbers will be on the program.

Prizes amounting to some \$75 are being offered for the contests and will undoubtedly attract a large attendance.

TIME TO USE SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH

Temperature reading taken by the County Agent shows that the codling moth is depositing eggs upon pears and apples. This means that all growers should apply the arsenic spray within the next five days.

Use arsenic of lead 2 pounds per 100 gallons spray material. It is also advisable to use some form of calcium caseinate spreader.

There will be exceptions to this spray program in some sections of the county, but the exceptions will apply within a period of ten days from date.

Growers should remember that we have no cures for the moth once it enters the fruit. The efficiency of the whole plan is based upon prevention.
