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U. S. MISSIONARY METHODS POOR, SAY JAPANESE

Tokio Educator Is Opposed to Cramming of New Ideas Into Youth

DOUBTS CO-EDUCATION

Country Is Sometimes Not Adaptable to Assimilation of Western Ideas and Methods

TOKIO, June 8.—Criticism for the foreign missionaries who have striven "too fast" to introduce foreign religion, foreign education and foreign principles generally into the life of the Japanese people formed a part of an interview recently by Mr. Tazuo Morioka, minister of education. Mr. Morioka's chief discussion was on the subject of co-education in Japan, but he took occasion to blame foreign missionaries for their part in "cramming" the young Japanese mind with too many ideas now in use in other countries.

Doubts Co-Education

Every thoughtful educator in Japan, says Mr. Morioka, is considering the subject of co-education and attempting to decide whether or not it will be a good thing for the people of Japan if carried too far at the present time. Universities and primary schools, Mr. Morioka pointed out, have adopted the idea of co-education, but he expressed the opinion that there was some doubt as to the wisdom of putting it into the middle schools for the time being.

Customs and national traits of the Japanese being vastly different from those of the Americans, there is a difference in the way that foreign institutions may be taken up bodily and made a part of life here, the Japanese minister of education points out. The Japanese mental attitude, he said, has been such in the past that the people have been over-eager to adopt foreign ideas and in the wholesale adoption of such methods have failed to digest them and make them a real and vital part of their national life.

Use Poor Method

The chief reason for the slow progress of Christianity in Japan, said Mr. Morioka, is the manner in which the American missionary has introduced his belief. If the American teacher really believes Christianity to be the universal religion, that religion ought to be adapted to the country and preached in a way that is consistent with the condition and circumstances of the country into which it is introduced. At the same time, he said, Japanese people themselves are partly to blame, because they lack initiative to adjust and put their religion into their daily life.

"Cramming" the Japanese people with foreign ideas, said the minister in conclusion, is one of the chief methods of failure to make good, solid progress with modern education here. Thinkers of capacity are needed in Japan, he said, and not people who are merely "well informed." He predicted that new methods of education will be introduced into the higher schools in the very near future.

EXPENSE OF LAWN ALMOST DEFRAYED

Financial Expenditures are Over Half Defrayed and High School Has Lawn that Does Credit to City.

That the construction of a lawn around the high school was not a venture and that the Parent-Teachers' Association was capable of paying for the work is proved by the fact that at present over half the expense of the construction has been liquidated and only a matter of about three hundred dollars remains yet to be raised.

When the work was started under the auspices of the P. T. A., and the Student Body of the high school there was some doubt in the minds of Roseburg as to whether or not these two organizations would be able to finance such an expensive improvement to the high school. However, the work was taken up on money borrowed by the P. T. A. from the various banks and a campaign immediately started to raise the money to repay the loan. The lawn cost in all about \$700 and at present over \$400 of that amount has been paid. Throughout the summer the P. T. A. expect to continue their work, the first attempt being the installation of a cold drink concession during the week of the Chautauque. Cooked food sales and lawn socials will also be held throughout the summer months and by the time school opens in the fall the association expects to have most of the remaining \$300 paid up and the lawn clear.

The lawn has grown at a surprising rate and now presents the appearance of a much older lawn than it really is. A few minor changes in the irrigation system are to be made

by the plumber, after which it is stated the lawn will be irrigated with one of the best systems obtainable.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE KANE STREET

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 4th day of June, 1923, the following resolution was adopted:

"RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, does it necessary and expedient, and hereby proposes to improve Kane Street from the South line of Lane Street to the end of dedicated street, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading said street to the proper sub-grade;

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-four feet in width with concrete pavement;

Third: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary;

Fourth: By constructing street monuments;

Fifth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary;

Sixth: By constructing catch-basins if necessary;

Seventh: By constructing concrete curbs.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans and specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 4th day of June, 1923, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including engineering, interest, and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$3269.41. RESOLVED, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said improvement as provided by the Charter of said City."

Remonstrances against said proposed improvement may be filed with the undersigned within twenty days from the first publication of this notice which is the 8th day of June, 1923.

GETTING PAPERS FOR NEW OIL COMPANY

The incorporation papers for the Sutherland Oil & Development company are now being prepared and the names of the incorporators will be announced within a few days, says the Sutherland Sun. It is also announced that lumber for the derrick and other buildings is now being cut at the Fenton & Norris mill east of town and that the company expects to have everything in shape for "spudding in" on the Fourth of July next.

C. G. Van Hook and Geologist Robert F. Campbell, who have spent several weeks in Sutherland Valley making a general survey of possible oil bearing structures here, are confident that oil exists here and have decided to make a thorough prospect of this field. Both these gentlemen have spent the past ten days in Roseburg with the company's attorney arranging the incorporation and other papers, which were completed on Tuesday of this week. Mr. Van Hook stated the other day that he is positive that oil will be found in Douglas county, and that the structure in Sutherland valley is the best which he has found in the state.

The company is being incorporated at the Douglas County Drillers, and the capital stock will be \$75,000. The board of directors will be composed entirely of local citizens, it is announced, who will have complete charge of all funds expended, and every dollar raised will be used in
