Miss Perry Visits Here—

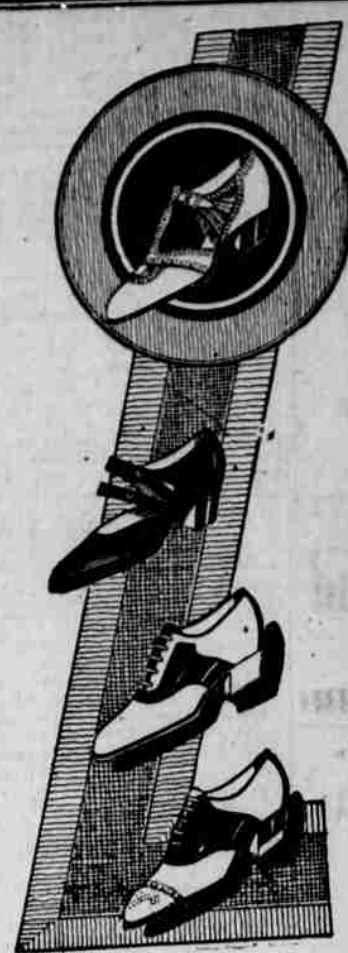
