Founder and Supreme Commander of the Women's Benefit Association

Entire Drill Team Attends Convention

Passing through Roseburg Thursday night on the W. B. A. Convention special was Miss Bina M. West, founder and supreme commander of the Women's Benefit Association who was re-elected at San Francisco on Monday as chief executive of the fraternal benefit society of women. Accompanying her were the supreme official staff of the association, and 136 supreme delegates, on their way to Portland where the quadrennial convention takes place Friday morning, at the Multnomah hotel.

A Grand State Marathon Pageant is to be staged at the auditorium Saturday when marathon victors will be crowned from all over the state by Miss West. A procession of the years in rainbow hues will be participated in by 350 members drawing in pantomime the history of the world and of the association since its founding 20 years ago.

The taking of the convention party was the initial move of the association to give its membership an opportunity to see America first. Miss West who is widely traveled stated today: "There is no place in the world more beautiful than the west, and I cannot see why people go abroad when their own country for small expense, will show beauties undreamed of in the old lands. We are too prone, as a nation," she continued, "to think that the world's beauties lie across the Atlantic ocean. We have them here, right at our door, and the next opportunity to be given by our association to the members will be a trip from 'Anywhere to Every-

where.' We had 10,000 visitors in Los Angeles and San Francisco on summer tourist tickets. Many of whom will be routed home via Portland and Seattle."

MY FAVORITE RECIPE

SUMMER CABBAGE
By Mrs. F. A. Bemis.
For this, one must have the tender thickly grown summer cabbage. Cut the heads into fourths. Boil in salted water until very tender. Carefully remove from kettle and pour off all water. Season with pepper and melted butter. This is very delicious and delicate.
