THINKS RUSSIA WILL AGAIN BE GRAIN MARKET

**Emerged Three Years Later
From War Than Rest of
Europe, Says Krassin**

WILL REGAIN STATUS

**Makes Prediction That Coun-
try Will Once More Be
World's Chief Raw
Material Source**

LONDON, June 11.—"Within the next few years Russia unquestionably will recover her pre-war position in the world market as a source of supply of grain, agricultural products and raw material."

Leonid Krassin, Foreign Trade Commissioner of Soviet Russia, makes this confident and bold prediction. "It must not be forgotten," Krassin said, "that Russia emerged from a state of war three years later than any other European country, and that during the European war she bore much heavier sacrifices, both economically and in loss of life."

Krassin then pointed out that the total value of Russia's exports has increased from \$10,000,000 in 1921 to \$40,000,000 in 1922. He stated that the anticipated value of exports in 1923 will be approximately \$200,000,000, an increase of 400 per cent per annum.

Soviet Rebuilding.
"The Soviet Government is making heroic efforts to rebuild transport and heavy industry," Krassin said. "The task is somewhat difficult, as the destruction and exhaustion of big factories and works, as well as the expense involved, are more considerable than in the middle and light industries. Nevertheless the great majority of branches have succeeded in maintaining their basic equipment in a more or less satisfactory state."

"Notwithstanding all difficult conditions and the havoc of the civil war the railways are slowly but ceaselessly increasing their efficiency, and the number of cars furnished every day for loading and unloading at a given place surpasses the maximum figures of the last five years."

Slowly Recovering.
"The textile and chemical industries are producing one-third of their pre-war figures."

"The position is somewhat worse in the coal mining industry, where equipment was exhausted before the revolution, especially the boilers, and where it was difficult to secure the power required."

"The oil industry at Baku is yielding already 50 per cent and in Grosny even 80 per cent of the pre-war figures. Poland and Rumania, who experienced neither blockade nor intervention and who, on the contrary, have received and are receiving foreign help in the form of loans, can hardly boast of the better state of their oil industries."

"On the whole we see, therefore, a slow but progressive reconstruction of Russian economic life."

"Little by little, in keeping with the general internal recovery of the country, is proceeding the development of our foreign trade."
