"We got rid of our dog, and I treated myself with gradually increasing injections of dog-hair protein. Since then I have been entirely free from asthma. "After being a martyr to asthma for twenty-two years, I am now well."

## ENGLAND URGED TO GIVE YOUTHS SEX EDUCATION

Think Policy Would Maintain Normal Birthrate and Elevate Morals

## TO CURE WAR REACTION

Bishop of Peterborough Is in Favor of Giving Mass Courses in Sex Hygiene

LONDON, May 11.—Education of adolescents in sex matters as a means of maintaining the normal birthrate and improving standards of morals alleged to have been lowered during the war is being urged strongly in England as the result of investigations conducted by the National Birthrate Commission. Pressure is being brought to bear upon the Government to provide some form of sex education in the public schools.

The Bishop of Peterborough, appearing as spokesman for the commission when it submitted its report recently to the Board of Education, declared that the object of the commission was "to call public attention to the question of training the younger citizens to right thinking and right action in regard to sex relationship, and more particularly in regard to the privileges and responsibilities of marriage and parenthood."

Not Yet Endorsed. The proposals put forward by the commission have not met with unanimous support, and as yet the Government has not expressed a willingness to inaugurate sex instruction as a part of the curriculum of the public schools. The matter, according to Lord Eustace Percy, under-secretary of the board, is one that requires "continual thinking."

The Bishop of Peterborough, however, is warmly in favor of mass instruction in sex hygiene. He believes that it is the most effective means of solving the entire problem of sex education.

"The vast majority of children will respond to the highest ideals if they are put before them with skill and sympathy," the bishop asserted. "If the faculty of curiosity is not satisfied wisely and truthfully a door is left open for future trouble."

Should Start at Home. This education should literally begin at home. The parents are primarily responsible. And yet it is a responsibility which in all classes of homes they are often unwilling or unable to meet. More might be done to help parents in this difficult and delicate side of their task.

"We are entirely agreed that teaching about sex in elementary and secondary schools of whatever class calls for the utmost care and discretion. A beginning might be made by the teaching of elementary biology."

"The child can be taught to regard with awe and reverence the august procession of life and thus avoid the notion, so common among children, that sex matters are a kind of hole and corner experience about which information must be acquired secretly."

The post-war reaction that has touched the morals of the country, the emphasis given the "seamy side" of married life in the press and the portraying in motion pictures of "emotions that need careful handling" are adverse influences which, the Bishop of Peterborough believes, would be offset by proper instruction in sex hygiene in the schools.

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## CROKER'S WILL CASE ON TRIAL

Richard Croker Charges His Father's Second Wife et al, Used Undue Suasion

## CASE WILL BE COSTLY

Old-Time Tradition and Ceremony Will Be Strictly Observed by Irish Justice

DUBLIN, June 11.—In the Dublin courts this week Richard Croker will contest the will of his late father, the former Boss of Tammany Hall. The chief point on which Croker will rely is that Mrs. Bula E. Croker, the Boss's second wife, with other persons unknown, exercised undue influence over his father in the making of the will.

Mrs. Croker denies this, and has the leading attorneys of the Irish bar fighting her case. Two senior attorneys, whose fee will be at least \$500 per day have been retained by her besides three juniors. Richard Croker has also five attorneys fighting the case for him besides A. B. Smith, the New York attorney, who has been in Ireland now two months piecing the case together. The expenses will be enormous. Witnesses have been staying at the leading hotels in Dublin enjoying first-class fare. Whoever loses the action will be out of pocket at least \$75,000 and that is a conservative estimate.

The case would be ordinarily heard in Four Courts only that massive pile of buildings was destroyed by the Irish Republicans last summer, and the court will be in an improvised room in Dublin Castle. Not for 250 years has a court of justice sat in the Castle until a few weeks ago, and the Croker case will hold the distinction of being the most expensive ever held there.

A special jury has been empanelled to try the action. The difference between a common jury and a special jury in Ireland is that a special jury is selected from the business community and receives a guinea for his services. In the case of the common or ordinary jury one guinea is divided amongst the twelve.

Mr. Justice Dodd who is the presiding judge, is a lawyer of long experience. He has been a judge of the supreme court for 16 years, and in his wig and flowing black gown reminds one of a figure from the 16th or 17th centuries.

The attorneys who will do the pleadings as is the custom in Irish and English courts will all wear wigs and gowns. No lawyer can appear before a judge without the regalia. The lawyers will not address the judge as "My Lord" but by the legal formula of "My Lord." When an attorney rises to address the court he begins with the phrase "May it please your Lordship," or, "If your Lordship please."

There are a great many formulas and customs in the Irish courts which will not be found in America, but they are all terribly expensive.

## SAYS COMMITTEE RUNS CONGRESS

Ex-Congressman Wants Rules Committee Abolished to Curb Minority Governing

## GOOD BILLS ARE KILLED

Easy for Big Interests to Control Committee, Which in Turn Tells Congress What Bills to Pass or Not Pass

CLEVELAND, June 11.—"Scrap the rules committee." Let the house itself decide by vote just what bills reported from committees it will take up and in what order.

This, in the opinion of Charles L. Knight, Akron and Springfield newspaper publisher, former congressman and candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of Ohio last year, is the greatest "reform" which could be brought about in congress.

"In this way," Knight told International News Service, "it may be possible to restore some of the great power and usefulness of congress before it ceased to be a deliberative body and became a registering machine for the decrees of the party bosses."

Knight served one term in congress. He declined to be a candidate for re-election, declaring it was a "waste of time."

"Under the rules of the house," Knight continued, "three or four men absolutely control the important legislation of the country, and the membership of that body finds itself tied and unable to function. The membership is restrained by a system which makes a successful fight against it hopeless, overawed by the imperious will of the leaders, afraid of being accused of party irregularity and ashamed to let its constituents know how helpless it really is, causes it rather to 'bear the ills it has than fly to others it knows not of.'"

The "Cannonism" Revolt. Knight reviewed the revolt against "Cannonism" in 1910, which resulted, as legislators then thought, in ending "one-man rule" in congress. He told of the new device—a committee on committees—whereby members were selected for the various standing committees.

"Members of this committee," he said, "were usually selected because of long service, and they put none but 'safe and sane' men on the important committees."

"But this powerful brake was not enough. Experience soon showed that it would not always hold, and the unwieldy size of the house furnished a specious argument for the application of an 'emergency brake.'"

"This was found by increasing the power of the rules committee. Thereafter committees might vote measures out until they were black in the face, but they never reached the floor unless the rules committee so decreed. Thus the rules committee becomes the final judge of what measures are to be acted upon. It brings in a rule declaring that after its adoption it shall be in order to take up the measure it names under the conditions specified in the rule. Such a rule can and frequently does kill every chance for illuminating debate, deny any right of any member to make any amendment, and before it the house finds itself gagged and helpless."

Effect on Legislation. The Fordney tariff bill was reported, considered and passed under a rule which prohibited anyone from offering amendments unless he was a member of the ways and means committee.

"The war refunding debt act was driven through the house under a rule almost without debate, and that, too, in face of the fact that the committee had had scant time to study it."

"But these measures are only symptomatic. No measure of any great importance escapes a like fate, and the country is so impressed with the idea that this must be done that it fails to see the perfect paradise thus created for the special interests to get any legislation they desire. If they can only properly impress a few men who may in no sense represent the will of congress, to say nothing about the will of the people."
