JAP STUDENTS' PACIFIST MOVE ALARMS TOKIO

Metropolitan Police Watching Attempt to Ban Military Training in College

CONSCRIPTION EVADED

Radical Thought in Schools Will Not Be Curbed Except Where It Is Necessary to Halt Overt Acts

TOKIO, June 12.—Fearing the spread of radicalism among the student bodies of Japan, the Metropolitan police of Tokyo are preparing to watch carefully the activities of the Cultural Federation, an anti-militarist organization, the members of which are older students in the leading Tokyo universities. The decision of the police to watch more carefully and, perhaps, to arrest the students in Waseda and other Tokyo universities comes as the result of agitation in Tokyo which caused the breakup recently of classes in military science.

Classes Broken Up.

The break up of the classes in Military Science in Waseda University brought about by a mass meeting, in which hundreds of students demanded the withdrawal of the military teachers from the list of the school's professors, was followed by similar trouble at Tokyo University. At the latter institution members of the faculty became involved in the anti-militarist demonstration, and several of the professors threatened to resign because of the attitude of the authorities toward a strict military course. University class work was practically suspended for several days, while the students and the professors opposing the study of war fought out the question with those representing the other faction.

So serious has the discussion of anti-militarism become in Tokyo that Mr. Kamada, Minister of Education, has been forced to get into the controversy, his attitude being that such arguments tend to increase the spread of radical thought in the schools of Japan.

Won't Curb Liberalism.

"It is unwise to interfere with students in their study of various phases of thought problems," said Mr. Kamada recently, "but it is entirely proper for the police to act if there be any disquieting conduct on the part of the students as the result of this study. It is, indeed, a serious matter for Japan if there is any move toward

unifying the various radical elements in our universities. It is most imperative to investigate the leaders of this recent demonstration."

Simultaneously with the outbreak against the study of militarism at Waseda and Tokyo universities came the statement of military men in Tokyo that the number of young men in their power to evade conscription into the army and the navy was increasing each month. Some students, the statement goes on, so strongly desire to get out of any military training that they injure their bodies to accomplish their purpose.

DeLapp, have been named, and their petitions have been liberally signed and filed so that their names will appear upon the school ballot which will soon be printed. Each of the four candidates will have liberal support and it is anticipated that there will be a heavy vote cast.
