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CHICAGO PLANS BOYS' MILITARY NAVAL ACADEMY

Preliminary Instruction for Annapolis or West Point to Be Objective

MAY MOVE TO LAKES

Influential Citizens Are Behind Project to Make School Greatest One in the United States

By KENNETH HARRIS International News Service Staff Correspondent. CHICAGO, June 13.—Chicago is soon to have the largest boys' military and naval academy in the United States.

America's boyhood, between the ages of 12 and 20, thus will have an opportunity to obtain preliminary training which will fit them for entrance into either West Point or Annapolis.

Camp Roosevelt, one of the most popular boys' camps maintained by the government, is to be reorganized and enlarged and moved to the Great Lakes Naval Training station.

Scores of supporters of this project met at the University club here recently and by unanimous vote decided to petition the navy department at Washington asking them to "take over the whole or part of the land and buildings west of the Great Lakes station for this purpose.

Angus S. Hibbard, chairman of the camp committee, said the camp will be operated on a non-profit basis for the present and will be made available to "Young America" at a price which will attract youths from all corners of the nation. Graduates of the camp academy and college will be eligible for regular commissions in either the army or the navy, Hibbard added. He further asserted that should the United States become engaged in war the federal government would take over the camp.

The site of the proposed camp comprises 605 acres of land, and plans recently outlined provide for a full educational and military curriculum.

According to incorporators of the camp, the project has been approved by President Harding, Secretary of War Weeks, and General John J. Pershing, and construction work will be rushed with all possible speed, it was said.
