SCHOOL LAWN IS BIG BETTERMENT

Parent-Teacher Association Deserving of Much Credit for Good Work

DONATION RECEIVED

Check for \$5 Presented to Committee to Aid in Reducing Indebtedness—Others may Help if They Desire

A decided improvement has been made at the high school by the lawn which has resulted from the efforts of the high school parent-teachers association. A sprinkling system has been installed, the ground seeded and well watered and the grass is now so thick and heavy that cutting is necessary almost daily.

This improvement has been one of the great forward steps in the campaign for a better looking city. It makes the high school yard much more attractive than at any time since the building was constructed. The building is a very pretty structure, but situated in the center of such a yard as has existed until recently its artistic features could not be appreciated. Now, however, it is able to enjoy looking at the building and the beautiful lawn which beyond question the finest in the city.

A great deal of credit is due the association and particularly its president, Mrs. B. W. Maddox, and Storey Hess, who was chairman of the committee. Although some thought the task too great to be undertaken, it was finally decided to go ahead with the proposition. Mr. Hess insisted that the work be done with a vision of the future and consequently the association went to considerable expense in putting in a sprinkling system. Pipe lines were laid to all parts of the yard and permanent sprinklers installed. These can be controlled by one valve so that the task of watering the large yard is greatly simplified, and at the same time a uniform drenching is possible.

It was necessary for the association to borrow a large sum of money to pay for this improvement and with the exception of \$52 received from the high school student body, the financial burden has been carried entirely by the association. Over half of the obligation has been met, but there still remains over \$300 to raise and an effort is now being put forth to secure this sum.

Some people who are generous in their consideration of the welfare of the public schools of the city, are endeavoring to aid in this work. The following letter together with a check for \$5, was received yesterday by Mrs. Maddox:

"Seeing in the Saturday evening's local newspaper that over half of the cost of the high school lawn had been collected, I enclose herewith my check for \$5 as a donation to help reduce the outstanding debt thereon. For the fine improvement of the high school grounds the ladies should be highly commended by the citizens of the town."

The association expects to maintain a refreshment booth on the Chequamegon grounds during the week the entertainments are in progress and will probably reap a fair profit which will be applied upon the debt. WASHINGTON, June 14.—The whole country is working with unemployment at the lowest ebb for twelve months, the United States labor department monthly survey announced. The analysis shows that the labor shortage is increasing, having become acute in some sections. Industrial labor is working full time and in some cases overtime, while unskilled labor is largely absorbed by roadbuilding and similar activities.

EXPECT DEITY TO COME BACK

Why Pueblo Indians Place Great Importance on the Perpetuation of the Holy Fire.

Among many of the religious forms of the Pueblo Indians, perhaps the most interesting was the perpetuation of the holy fire, by the side of which the Aztecs kept a continual watch for the return to earth of Quetzalcoatl—the god of Air—who, according to their tradition, visited the earth and instructed the inhabitants in agriculture and other useful arts. During his sojourn he caused the earth to yield ten-fold productions, without the necessity of human labor. Everywhere corn, fruit and flowers delighted the eye; the cotton-plant produced its wool already dyed by nature with various hues, aromatic odors pervaded the air, and on all sides resounded the melodious notes of singing birds.

Quetzalcoatl embarked in his boat of rattleskins, on the Gulf of Mexico, and as he was seen to steer to the eastward, his arrival was consequently looked for from that quarter. When the Spaniards arrived from the east, as they resembled the god in the color of their skin, they were at first generally supposed to be the messengers from, or descendants of, the god of the air.

LENGTH OF DAY IS BIG FACTOR

Useful in Determining Whether or Not Alfalfa Seed Is of Suitable Variety.

Experiment in Greenhouse

Peruvian, Turkistan and Grimm Have Own Peculiar Reactions When Grown Out of Season—Avoid Argentine in North.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The peculiar reactions of plants to a change in the length of day to which they are accustomed is being found useful in determining whether or not alfalfa seed is of the variety recommended and whether it is adapted to conditions in the sections of the country where it is being sold. By growing the seed in greenhouses in the late fall and winter the United States Department of Agriculture has been able to determine the suitability of alfalfa seed from Argentina to conditions in this country. As a result, it has been determined that this seed is not adapted to the northern part of the United States. Most of it should not be grown any farther north than Kansas-grown seed.

Tell Different Groups.

By growing the seedlings for a short time in the greenhouse it is possible to tell to what group they belong. For instance, Peruvian, Kansas-grown common, Turkistan, and Grimm have their own peculiar reactions when grown

PIERCE AND KOZER INSPECT HOME

Governor and Secretary of State Examine into Conditions at State Institution—Bids on New Work to Be Received June 19

Governor Walter M. Pierce, arrived here this afternoon from Ashland where he spoke last night, and was met by Secretary of State Sam Kozer who arrived this morning and spent several hours visiting with friends here. This afternoon they made an inspection at the Soldiers Home where they visited all of the buildings and checked up on new work which the State Board of Control is planning.

The secretary of state says that the bids for the new kitchen and mess hall at the Soldiers Home will be received on June 19. It is the aim of the State Board of Control to get the work completed as soon as possible. Bids will also be received for new construction or additions to the Pendleton Asylum, the blind school, feeble minded home and tuberculosis home. The institutions for the adult blind at Portland will be finished about July 1 and will be occupied immediately.

Following the inspection of the home this afternoon, Mr. Kozer planned on playing golf at the country club grounds, and losing enough balls to keep the club members supplied for some time to come.

fall and winter when the hours of daylight are shorter the seedlings of these various groups develop characteristic differences in height, erectness and branching.

As a result of the discovery of the effect of the length of day on the performance of alfalfa plants, the ability of this crop to endure cold will not be the only factor to be considered in selecting varieties for the parts of the country with rigorous winters. The number of hours of daylight will have something to do with their selection. In the Southwest, Peruvian alfalfa starts earlier in the spring and keeps going later in the fall than other alfalfas, and is not particularly benefited by long periods of daylight, but the plants suffer considerable winter injury this far north. Northern varieties, on the other hand, do not adapt themselves to the short days of Arizona. This shows why varieties of one section, even though they may be hardy enough, cannot be used successfully in some other localities.

Not Suitable in North.

If you buy Argentine seed you can be sure that it is not suitable in the north. It should be grown at least no farther north than Kansas seed. Large quantities of seed are being imported from the Argentine; in fact most of the imported alfalfa now comes from that country. From July 1, 1922, to January 15, 1923, approximately 6,320,000 pounds were received from that country and only 281,000 pounds from other countries.

WOODCHUCKS DAMAGE CROPS

Unusually Large Number of Complaints Received From Many Sections Last Year.

An unusually large number of complaints of an abundance of woodchucks and damage by them have been received by the biological survey, United States Department of Agriculture, during the past year from points in the Eastern states. These animals have also continued to be destructive in the Northwest to alfalfa and cultivated crops. One farmer reported that they entirely cleaned up 40 acres of wheat and ten acres of alfalfa and took nearly seeded corn out of two acres of ground.

Demonstration by the biological survey of effective methods for destroying the animals has enabled landowners greatly to reduce the losses. After a demonstration in which one ounce of strychnine alkaloid was used to poison green alfalfa tops, 81 dead woodchucks were found.

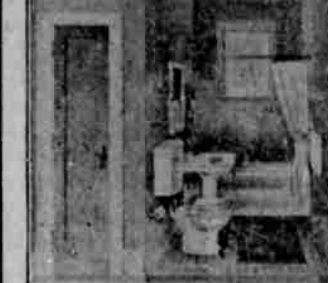
