BRITON FOND OF LIQUOR

LONDON, June 14.—Sudden reformation of the drinking habits of the British nation is not attainable, says the report of the special committee appointed by the British labor party to inquire into the question of prohibition, made public today.

The committee says it perceives that the British people are not at all likely to vote a national prohibitory law. The report expresses regret over the absorption of the time and energy of reformers in Great Britain in advocating what the committee regards as for the time being an impracticable measure.

BLUE SKY LAWS SUBJECT

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 14.—Governor Hart today announced that he would appoint an unpaid commission from this state to collaborate with similar commissions from Idaho, Oregon and Montana to consider blue sky legislation in reference to the mining industry with a view of submission to the legislatures of these states at their next sessions.

No appointments have been made. The governor made the decision at the request of Sidney Norman, Spokane, governor of the Washington branch of the American mining congress.

HEAVY FINE GIVEN LAW VIOLATOR

GRANTS PASS, June 15.—One of the heaviest penalties yet meted out in Josephine county for a violation of the prohibition laws, was given this morning to Lee York. York changed his plea of not guilty to guilty, in the face of the evidence in the hands of the county officers, and received a sentence of six months in the county jail and a fine of \$500. The court pointed out that he could have been given a jail sentence of two years for the crime of selling intoxicating liquor, to which he pleaded guilty.

York was arrested last Monday afternoon while working on the irrigation canal south of the city. The prisoner led the sheriff and deputy a merry chase through the southeast part of town for about an hour. He was finally cornered in the barn belonging to J. D. Pernell, where he surrendered. The officers had secured evidence which pointed to the fact that York was selling liquor. They began work on the case on Monday and secured sufficient evidence to warrant the arrest being made.

The preliminary hearing was held on Tuesday and the trial set for Saturday morning. As York had served time for two previous offenses he evidently decided to take a chance of pleading guilty. When sentence was pronounced this morning he is said to have taken the blow extremely hard. He stated to the court that he would never be able to serve the whole term as his health was so poor that he would not last that long. During his last imprisonment he was in poor health.
