BRITISH FLYWEIGHT KNOCKED OUT ONCE IN FIGHTING CAREER

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, June 15.—Jimmy Wilde, world flyweight champion, who will defend his title in a 15-round match Monday with Pancho Villa, the Philippine mite, at the Polo Grounds, has been called the perfect fighting machine.

Master of all the tricks and punches of the trade, Wilde has had the greatest boxing career of any living pugilist of the British Isles. In more than a dozen years in the ring he was knocked out but once. Pete Herman, former world bantamweight champion, sent Wilde down for the count in the 15th round of a picturesque fight in London in January, 1921. Wilde has been idle since that defeat.

Born in a hamlet near Cardiff, Wales, 31 years ago the twelfth of last month, Wilde entered the pugilistic game when a mere strip of a lad. He soon became a wily, clever boxer, fashioned in the English mold. Then, taking a lesson from the American game, he developed a punch.

He won half of his contests by knockouts. Bantams and flyweights alike fell before him. He whipped everything in the British Isles and on the continent within ten pounds of his own weight and came on to America several years ago. Joe Lynch, the present world bantamweight champion, Pal Moore of Memphis and lesser known American small men were defeated by him. Jack Sharkey, New York bantam, Wilde's first opponent in the U. S. in a 10-round no decision contest in 1919, was credited by some boxing writers with a shade the better of the milling.

Wilde is a clean-cut, typically British in manner of dress and an entertaining conversationalist. He is married and has two sons.

The boxing records have gathered statistics on 127 of Wilde's pugilistic engagements. He is credited with 63 knockouts, 50 victories by decisions, three draws, two lost decisions, one loss by a knockout, five no decisions and three exhibitions.

His fighting weight is 112 pounds, the actual flyweight limit. He is a little broader of shoulder and stiffer of jaw than Villa and has, perhaps, the harder punch. In other respects they are about on a parity.

UNIVERSITY MAN GOING TO EUROPE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 15. (Special).—Dean Eric W. Allen of the University of Oregon School of Journalism will sail for Europe about the middle of August to spend several months in England and on the continent. While Dean Allen's trip is a vacation journey, he will devote some time to a first-hand study of European newspapers and their methods. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Allen. They will visit England, France, Italy, and possibly Germany.

Dean Allen will return to America in time to preside over the winter meeting of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism, which will be held in Chicago.

The Oregon man will start on his vacation trip immediately after the close of the University of California summer school at Berkeley. For the seventh summer he will have charge of a six weeks' course in journalism at a California summer session.

Dean Allen has taught at the University of Oregon continuously since the work was inaugurated in 1912, and the European trip will be his first extended vacation. In his absence Professor George S. Turnbull will serve as acting dean.

SUPREME COURT TO HAVE BUSY TERM

SALEM, June 15.—The constitutionality of the gasoline tax as applied to municipally owned vehicles, the status of the Klamath county court houses, and several other cases of more than ordinary interest and importance are scheduled for argument before the supreme court within the next three weeks.

The constitutionality of the gasoline tax comes before the court for argument in the case of the city of Portland vs. Secretary of State Koser on June 26. The city of Portland has attacked the right of the state to collect the tax on gasoline used in municipally owned vehicles.

On the same date arguments are to be heard in the case of Rhode vs. the Industrial Accident Commission which is up before the court at this time on a rehearing.

Two Klamath county court house cases are set for argument on June 27. The case of Ward vs. Klamath county involves the question of which of the three court houses now owned by Klamath county is to be recognized as the legal and regularly constituted seat of county government. The case of Klamath county vs. the Klamath Development company involves the title to the land on which the "Hot Springs" court house is located, this site being donated to the

Arguments in the case of the State vs. A. J. Weston are to be heard by the court on June 28. Weston is charged with the murder of Robert Krugg. He was convicted in the circuit court of Deschutes county and sentenced to a life term in the state prison but this decree was reversed and the case remanded for a new trial.

In the second trial Weston was again sentenced to a life term in the penitentiary and this decree is now on appeal before the supreme court. On this same date the court will hear arguments in the case of Smith vs. Hurlbut, an appeal from Multnomah county involving the collection of water taxes in the Maplewood Water district.

The case of Wemmer vs. the Scientist church, involving the distribution of the Wemmer estate, a portion of which was left to the Scientist church, is up before the court for argument on June 29. On this same day the court will hear arguments in the case of Harnes vs. Anderson.

The Hood River irrigation district case has been set for argument before the supreme court on July 2.

CAPITAL STOCK RETURNS SENT OUT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 15.—Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, today released the capital stock tax returns, for the period beginning July 1, 1922, and ending June 30, 1923. This is a tax on fair value of the capital stock of a corporation, payable in advance for the privilege of doing business, and should not be confused with corporation income tax. Returns should be filed as of June 30, 1923, and must be in the collector's office not later than July 31st.

According to Collector Huntley, every corporation must file a return, whether or not it is subject to tax. A penalty of \$1000 will be incurred for delinquency in filing. Unless a corporation has been actually dissolved, a return properly sworn to and acknowledged must be filed, even though the corporation is temporarily "inactive."

Blank returns have been mailed to all corporations as nearly as possible. But in the case of newly organized corporations, or in the case of corporations the addresses of which have been recently changed, return blanks may fail to reach them. This fact, however, does not relieve the taxpayer from the responsibility of filing the return, as blanks may be obtained from the collector's office upon request.

If check for the amount of tax accompanies the return, it will greatly expedite the work of the Portland office as well as of the department at Washington.

GREAT STRIDES SEEN FOR WEST

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 15.—Visions of electrified railroads more common than steam lines are today and fuller development of hydro-electric resources, which will naturally follow or occur simultaneously with greater development of irrigation and agricultural resources of New York, president of the General Electric Company, sees material some of the things Gerard Swope is doing in the west within the next decade or two. Mr. Swope was a recent Salt Lake visitor and while here inspected numerous electrical projects in this vicinity.

Electrification of railroads on a large scale Mr. Swope said he believed inevitable. "It is best from an economic viewpoint. Also, more efficiency would be possible. When it is considered that practically one-fourth of all tonnage hauled by steam railroads is coal consumed by the railroads themselves an idea of the proposition may be obtained."

COTTAGE GROVE MAN STRUCK BY TRAIN

COTTAGE GROVE, June 15.—J. A. Joll narrowly escaped death Monday evening when his car was struck by a Southern Pacific freight train at the crossing just north of Saguinaw. Mr. Joll was on his way to Saguinaw and was approaching the crossing from the east. View of the tracks at that point is obstructed by brush along the roadway and Mr. Joll neither saw nor heard the train, which was approaching from the south, until it was upon him.

The car, which was a new Ford sedan, was caught up by the pilot of the engine and, with Mr. Joll inside, was carried across the road and cattle guard, a distance of 86 feet, and thrown in a shapeless mass on the east side of the track. Mr. Joll was taken from the demolished car by members of the train crew and hygienists. He suffered a broken left arm, torn ligaments in the left shoulder, minor bruises and some cuts from flying glass.

Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Conn, of Portland, who were on their way to Cottage Grove to visit with friends, witnessed the accident and with the assistance of Mrs. F. T. Beniston, of Saguinaw, who arrived a few moments after the crash, took Mr. Joll to his home in their car. The accident was also witnessed by Mrs. Geo. Fogle, of Saguinaw.

Though suffering severely from his injuries and from shock, Mr. Joll's condition is reported to be very satisfactory.

AUSTRALIAN RHODES SCHOLARS LEAD IN STUDIES AND SPORTS

MELBOURNE, June 15.—(A. P.)—Australian Rhodes scholars lead in scholarship and scholastic honors among all the Rhodes scholars from British dominions and the United States according to the recent report of the trustees of the Cecil Rhodes Fund.

In Arts, Australian candidates who took honors of the first class are 28 per cent, as against 15 per cent for the United States, 14.5 per cent for Canada, and 4 per cent for South Africa. The proportion of scholarships won by the scholars at Oxford by Australia 15, Canada 11.5, United States 11.

Australian scholars also lead in athletics during their stay at the university.

GERMAN CAPITAL SEEKING INVESTMENT IN FAR EAST

LONDON, June 15.—(A. P.)—German trade magnates are seeking control of the coal, iron and oil of China, according to information supplied to the British Board of Trade from trustworthy sources.

Th. Stinnes interests have \$2,000,000 already invested in coal concessions in Ho-nan, Hu-nan, and near Peking. This group has found oil in Che-kaing and is interested also in coal near Hang-Chow. The big Stinnes corporation of Germany has \$4,000,000 invested in coal and iron concessions in Shantung, Ho-nan, Hu-nan and near Hang-Chow. In Szechuan this company has something like \$1,000,000 invested in coal and iron concessions. Thirty-eight German engineers are now waiting in Shanghai for instructions to proceed to various centers.

The pressure of the new economic conditions imposed upon Germany by the results of the great war and the difficulties arising out of the payment of reparations, has prompted German capitalists to seek a profitable outlet for their capital in the east. In pre-war days the main interests of Germany lay in the west. Many of the western markets are now more or less closed to her, and reports are accumulating of schemes for the extension of the commercial interests of Germany in Russia, China, and other eastern markets.
