WASHINGTON, June 16.

President Harding informally told members of the shipping board last night at a dinner to retiring Chairman Lasker "that at present government operation is our only resort." Expressing disappointment at the failure of the administration shipping bill, the president said he has seen "too many manifestations of desire of other nations to impede our work and so many evidences of desire of others to halt our plans."

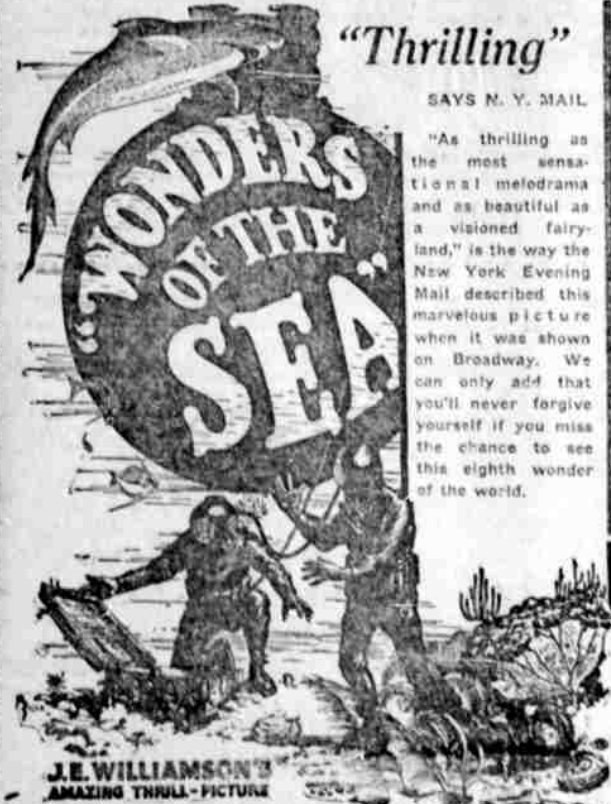
