will be social and not individual—a church that will lift its voice against the social sins instead of individual sins. Christ appealed to the goodness in men and endeavored to lead them to accept his teachings and not to drive them. The churches of today are trying to drive to religion and not to lead. The church is the pillar of civilization. What we need is fewer litanies and more of the brotherhood of man and the teachings of Christ.

"The third cry of the young man is eugenics. Leaders are demanded in all nations. Nature must be given a chance to produce these great leaders who can guide the nations through the troublesome times. If we observe the laws of God the leaders will come. The command 'Do unto others' refers to the unborn as well as the born. A clean bill of health must be demanded before marriage. We must control the unfit or they will control us."

"The young men demand a constructive instead of a destructive science to provide more happiness in the world. They saw science in the war times producing war machines to kill and destroy and create unhappiness. They now insist that science give up its efforts to create more poison gases and invent hellish machines to destroy, and turn to the task of creating greater happiness, harnessing the tides and winds and making them serve mankind."

"Another demand is that of internationalism. They want economical relations between nations. They want things done in an international way. To reduce armaments all nations must observe the same rules. Political internationalism is not desired, but international methods of fighting disease, reducing armies and navies and establishing economical relations must come."

The speaker concluded with the statement that the young men of the world have recognized the rocks upon which future civilization was wrecked and are now determined that the present civilization shall survive. They do not want war and will not go to war unless they are forced to by the encroachments of other nations. The old men make wars and the young men pay the price. The young men are tired of paying and in the future will go far to avert wars and killings such as Europe has known in the past few years.

FRUIT CARAVAN COMING THURSDAY

Growers From Willamette Valley Will Inspect Association Properties in Southern Part of State.

Fruit growers from the Willamette Valley will spend the night of June 21 in Roseburg, on the first annual fruit caravan which will visit the southern part of the state. The party will leave Salem on the morning of June 21 and will arrive at Medford on the morning of the 23rd. The caravan has been arranged by the Oregon Growers' Cooperative Association to acquaint its directors and members with the various fruit plants operated by the association in the Umpqua, Willamette and Rogue River valleys.

Earl Pearcey, formerly of Roseburg, now district manager of the association is directing the caravan and reports that 20 or 40 cars will make the trip. Any fruit grower is invited. The first stop out of Salem will be at the H. W. Johnson's famous Oregon apple orchard at Monroe. At Eugene a trip will be made through the cannery operated by J. O. Holt.

A big dinner will be served at Sutherlin where the ladies have arranged to serve at noon. The afternoon will be spent inspecting the association plant at Sutherlin and the party will then come to Roseburg to spend the night. Inspecting the local properties the following morning and then going on to Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland, where the 23rd will be spent. On Sunday many of the party expect to go to Crater Lake. It is planned to make this an annual affair in the future.

The other five ponds have all been enlarged, adding greatly to the capacity of the hatchery. Six hundred thousand trout fry have already been hatched this season, and there are 420,000 eggs yet to hatch.

STATE SPORTSMEN ARE SATISFIED

Meeting at Portland Fails to Develop Into Fireworks Display as Was Expected—Ask Fleischner to Stay on Job

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—With assurances that State Game Warden Burghdoff and Superintendent of Hatcheries Ryckman will not be disturbed by the newly appointed state game commissioners, the second annual meeting of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association was devoid of the fireworks expected. Delegates to the convention here today made it plain that they will start nothing unless the game warden and hatchery superintendent are dismissed.

Before the adjournment, the delegates, representing 18 counties, signed a letter addressed to I. N. Fleischner, the only commissioner not removed from office by Governor Pierce, requesting him that if he contemplates resigning that he will reconsider such a resolve.

How sportsmen feel toward the department, as it is now administered was set forth clearly by several speakers. A. K. Downs of Prineville, after tracing the improvements in the department resulting in increased fishing and pheasants and the increased number of arrests for violations of the game laws, said: "We will get behind the new commission while Burghdoff is retained and Ryckman is kept for the hatcheries."

In presiding over the meeting, Judge Charles M. Thomas of Medford pointed out that there is a fund of \$300,000 raised by sportsmen in Oregon, this money coming from licenses. He warned them that this fund would be a target for legislators seeking appropriation and declared that already there are rumors of taking part of this money and placing it in the general treasury of the state. The money is a voluntary fund, he stated, donated by men who want to preserve the wild life, and the contributors have a right to be consulted and to advocate a game program in the big, broad viewpoint for the best interest of the state.

H. Frederic, Hood River; F. C. Foster, Tillamook; C. I. Harvey, Klamath Falls; A. V. Andrews, Union; L. L. Crocker, Roseburg, and Ed Rositter, Salem.

HARDING WILL SPEAK BY RADIO

KANSAS CITY, June 19.—When President Harding, starting on his trans-continental tour to Alaska, arrives in St. Louis June 21 he will deliver the first of the important addresses to be made on that trip. The address will be broadcast by station K S D. It will be the first time a president of the United States has been heard over the radio.

A number of broadcasting stations throughout the country, as a courtesy to the president, will remain silent while he speaks. It is the intention to make this occasion a test to determine whether, under ideal conditions, the president of the United States can be heard in every state of the Union. JIMMY WILDE LOSES TO VILLA

(By Associated Press.)
POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, June 18.—Pancho Villa, fighting dynamo from the Philippines, who was dethroned as American flyweight title holder only a few months ago, rose to world's championship heights tonight when he knocked out Jimmy Wilde, British holder of the crown.

In the seventh round of a battle that was spectacular from start to finish despite its one-sidedness. Rushing and slashing with a terrific assault that had Wilde prostrate and reeling in the first round, Villa's victory was one of the most decisive in the annals of world's championship history.

Wilde was but the shell of the once great boxer, who had held undeviated away among the little men of the ring for years. Only his marvelous swiftness and the heart of a master fighter enabled him to last as long as he did. He stood up under the most deadly of attacks for his month and checked and with his right eye virtually closed. Occasionally he took the offensive but his punches were feeble and failed to shake his opponent. But though his legs sagged at the knees and his body wavered under a devastating attack, Wilde's bulldog courage kept him in the thick of the fray, bloody and hopeless a picture as he was.

The little Welshman, nearly blinded, shook his head as his seconds urged him to quit and staggered to his feet to answer the bell for the seventh round.
