CONTRACTS LET FOR STATE BUILDINGS

L. W. Metzger Successful Bidder On New Building at Soldiers Home; Kitchen and Mess Hall Will Be Constructed.

The contract for the construction of the kitchen and mess hall at the Soldiers Home was let yesterday by the state board of control to Contractor L. W. Metzger of this city whose proposal was in the sum of \$15,795.

Altogether the state board allowed four new state buildings and for other improvements aggregating \$157,654.

Contracts let by the board were as follows: State institution for feeble-minded boys' dormitory—General contract, G. W. Frazier, \$33,490; heating, L. E. Inman, \$2,550; plumbing, L. E. Inman, \$3,050.

Eastern Oregon Hospital for the Insane, finishing basement and third floor—Hilmer J. Settergren, \$47,695.

State Tuberculosis Hospital, open air pavilion—General contract, Crisp, Newell & Crisp, \$14,550; heating, L. E. Inman, \$500; plumbing, \$1,344.50.

State School for Blind boys' dormitory—General contract, Hoover & McNeil, \$26,472; plumbing and heating, C. R. Yandt, \$8,934.

Oregon Employment School for the Blind in Portland, pavement, sidewalk, etc.—Alxson & Anderson, \$4,774.34.

HARDING LEAVES ON TRIP TO COAST

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(Copyright by United Press.)—President Harding leaves Washington today, ready, after two weeks of intensive preparation, to give the country while enroute to Alaska an accounting of his administration.

While he declines any political significance in his tour, he has prepared speeches on several big 1924 issues, including transportation, the wet and dry question, farmers' difficulties, taxes and the tariff.

Sells Newspaper Stock

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(Associated Press.)—President Harding has disposed of his control stock of the Harding Publishing company, publishers of the Marion Star, to Louis M. Brush and Roy D. Moore.

The president and his party will cover over 15,000 miles by train, boat and motor before returning to the White House via Panama Canal two months hence. There are approximately 70 in the presidential party and they are traveling in a special train of ten cars.

Among them are the Secretary of the Interior and Mrs. Work, Mrs. Hoover, the secretary to the president and Mrs. George D. Christian Jr., Speaker Gillett, Admiral Rodman, Brigadier General and Mrs. C. E. Sawyer.

MEXICAN KILLED ON COOS BAY LINE

EUGENE, June 20.—Margarito Solis, Mexican laborer for the Southern Pacific company on the crew of the wrecker clearing the tracks on the Coos Bay line near Cushman Monday, was killed there about 9:45.

In the evening, Meager details of the accident are merely that the man had been riding on the speeder, the power-driven handcar, when killed in an accident. Coroner W. W. Branstetter, who is holding the body here, learned indirectly that the man had just stepped from the car and fell, striking his head a blow on some hard substance, either a rock, rail or the corner of the vehicle.

Solis and an uncle, who came across the boundary from Mexico into this country about a month ago, were in the crew, having joined it within the past 10 days. Branstetter is awaiting instructions for disposal of the body.
