In the last of the eighth Harrisburg put in a pinch hitter who drove in two runs, winning the game for that aggregation. It was a fine exhibition of baseball and all of the fans who witnessed the game were well pleased.

MARSHFIELD MAN KILLED IN WRECK

Auto Driven by J. F. Mast Goes Over Grade on Coos Bay Highway Near Remote—Wife Sustains Bad Injuries

MARSHFIELD, June 25.—J. Finley Mast, aged 49, a cousin of County Judge Mast, was instantly killed and his wife seriously injured when their Ford touring car plunged off the grade on the Roseburg highway near Remote and fell between 75 and 100 feet to the rocks below. The tragedy occurred when Mr. Mast, en route to his former home in Coquille from Pomona, drove his car too close to the edge of the grade in passing a team and wagon. Loosened by the recent heavy rains, the dirt gave way and before the light car could be swerved back to safety it had started on its wild plunge down the mountainside. When the car turned over the first time, Mrs. Mast was thrown to one side, but her husband, caught beneath the steering wheel, catapulted with the fated car as it careened from boulder to boulder on its mad rush to the bottom. Other autolots, drawn to the tragic scene, assisted Mrs. Mast, who was bruised and bleeding, up the rough path to the roadway, where she was placed in a passing car and rushed to Pemberton hospital at Myrtle Point. Far below, the little Ford was found, a mass of wreckage. Beneath the debris of twisted steel and wood there lay the lifeless body of Mr. Mast. With great difficulty the body was carried up the steep embankment, and it was taken to Myrtle Point. Mr. and Mrs. Mast formerly resided at Fishtrap, near Coquille. They removed to Pomona about 27 years ago.

METZGER BUILDING COQUILLE HOTEL

COQUILLE, Ore., June 25.—The excavating for the foundation of the new hotel in Coquille has been completed. This was done under a separate contract and now Contractor Metzger of Roseburg, who is to put up the building, is on hand and has started his work. The molds for the concrete piers have been built and material is being assembled. The construction of the hotel is to be hastened with all possible speed and the Coquille people are looking forward with much anticipation to its completion, as the lack of a large hotel in the city has been felt.
