CIVIC STANDARDS

Every city that grows rapidly has specially high civic standards. Some have had a rapid expansion in population owing to the speedy development of certain manufacturing industries. That kind of growth is not always desirable. In many cases however, growth has been the result of the public spirit of the citizens in maintaining high standards. The people of such places have been determined to provide the best facilities of community life. Cities of that type have a lot of honest pride. They feel that they have a certain reputation, and that they must live up to it by providing first class schools and streets and walks and parks and playgrounds and other like facilities. If you show them that their equipment is defective and below standard in any respect, they will go the limit to create improvement in that particular, and offer the public what it expects in a community of that type. It may cost a little more money to live in a town of that character. But the people who own property in such places have not commonly suffered, because their real estate or their business has constantly grown more valuable. People are willing to pay higher prices to secure a residence in such a community, and they feel they get more out of life. Taxes may not in the long run be any higher, in spite of expensive improvements, because such towns draw in a class of people who have a good deal of assessable property. The business opportunities are usually better in such places, because they attract people who have money to spend. Such places, then are usually growing towns, not the mushroom growth that surprises all observers, but a steady increase that exceeds the average gain for the state and section where the place is located.
