L. D. CRANSTON IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Louis D. Cranston, a resident of North Roseburg for more than nine years, died at his home at an early hour this morning following an illness of about 48 hours duration. Mr. Cranston was born at Wheelersburg, Ohio, October 20, 1858, and was 65 years of age. He was married to Jennie R. Camp October 29, 1905, who survives him. Deceased was a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families of his native country in Ohio, and of the six children in his father's family, only one survives, Mr. Frank Cranston, who still lives at the old home in Wheelersburg. Mr. Cranston was an esteemed member of the Western Sons Lodge, A. F. and A. M. of Wheelersburg. For many years during his young manhood he worked as a railroad engineer, but finally gave up that avocation and entered the government service, and for a long time served with the Coast Survey corps, working in that department in the Pacific Coast states.

It was following his retirement from this employment that he and Mrs. Cranston located in Roseburg, where they have made many friends in the neighborhood where they resided. Always amiable and of exalted moral standards, Mr. Cranston was a gentleman of the old type whose life as a good citizen of great moral worth is worthy of emulation. It had been his expressed desire that whenever his life's work was over that he might pass quickly, and in the sudden death which overtook him this morning he had his prayer granted.

Funeral services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 7 o'clock this evening, and friends of the family are invited to attend. Rev. Gordon of the M. E. church, will conduct this service.

The body will be shipped to Lewiston, Idaho, tomorrow, where funeral services will be held before interment. Mrs. Cranston, who has the sincere sympathy of her many friends and acquaintances, will accompany the remains. She will be accompanied by her sister, Mrs. T. C. Moxley, and the latter's daughter, Miss Jessie Moxley, who arrived here from Clarkston last evening.

AN APPRECIATION OF "THE MIKADO"

It is the unanimous opinion of the hundreds who witnessed the production of this comic opera that it was one of the best musical attractions ever put on in Coquille. The principals and chorus made all their friends proud of them for the way they staged an opera of this character with only four weeks' training. Mr. Wilson is recognized as an able director, but even he could not have achieved the results he did had he not had unusually capable material to work with.

The audience was kept in a continual state of excitement and applause both evenings and the several musical numbers were encored again and again—Coquille Valley Sentinel, June 1st, 1923.

The rehearsals are being held nightly at the Armory and the cast committee for the E. of P.'s earnestly request that those who have agreed to assist in the production be on hand at each rehearsal, if possible, as an opera of this character cannot be produced with participants coming in to the cast for a few rehearsals before the performance are given, as in a musical comedy or minstrel show.

EVANGELIST HAS DODGE 'LAND BOAT'

Traveling in a Dodge business sedan, Captain G. L. Hall, evangelist, was in town today from 1914, where he is holding meetings for the benefit of the ranchmen and stockmen and their families of that locality. It will be remembered by very many that Captain Hall visited Roseburg several months ago, and while in this vicinity held meetings at Melrose, and gave a Bible evening at the Baptist church in this city. Those of the people in Douglas county who were so fortunate as to meet Captain Hall on that occasion will not soon forget him or his work. For a number of years Captain Hall conducted missionary work in the Coos Bay country, and was in charge of the mission school that operated on the bay. He has preached in the logging camps and backwoods districts of most sections of the northwest coast country, and has a real message of hope for people in the out-of-way places. He has held services in dance halls and resorts of the water front life of the big cities of the coast, and carries with him a lot of bibles and testaments which he sells or gives away. These books when sold help to defray the expenses of the work Captain Hall is engaged in, but whenever he finds a family or individual in need of a bible, but unable to buy it, he makes such persons a gift of a copy. He is working without salary, his efforts being sustained wholly by offerings.

The Dodge business sedan has recently been put in commission and has been provided by a fund contributed by friends of the road work. These contributions have come in from all over the northwest field, and with the car Captain Hall can now reach many remote homes or camps that were heretofore inaccessible. This "land boat," as it is termed, has appropriate lettering on the windows, indicating the mission of the "craft," and will be used in rendering service to the people in town and settlements back from the railroads. Captain Hall has visited a great many sections of eastern Oregon since he was here last fall, and preaches on an average 25 sermons every month.
