LOWEL ASTRONOMERS DISCOVER NEW STAR
FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., June 27.—(A. P.)—Dr. C. O. Lampland of Lowell observatory here has announced the discovery of a new star located in a spiral nebula of the southern heavens in the constellation Centaurus.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilmore, residents of Tillamook, were in this city today and attending to other business.

Mr. H. W. Strong, resident of H. L. Caldwell, will enter a Baptist Missionary society today afternoon, at 7:30 o'clock at street. A very interesting sermon has been prepared by Mr. Paul.

The nebula in Centaurus, known as Messier 83, has been observed at Lowell observatory for many years for the purpose of detecting changes which might occur in it. With the modern highly improved and accurate optical instruments used in the comparison of photographs of different dates, it is possible to detect extremely small differences in the details of the photographic plates used. Dr. Lampland is explaining the discovery.

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
