WOULD ALLEVIATE HUNGER PAINS OF PHILIPPINE PAGANS

MANILA, June 25.—(A. P.)—Governor General Wood has taken steps to bring about the economic development of the Mountain Province where the people, who belong to the non-Christian tribes, are engaged in what the chief executive terms "a desperate struggle for bare existence." In a communication to Jose Sanvictores, director of the bureau of non-Christian tribes, General Wood asks that a plan be prepared which would eliminate the handicaps to the economic improvement of those regions.

The governor's communication to Mr. Sanvictores is based on a report submitted by Lieutenant Colonel Gordon Johnston, member of the governor's staff, who has just made an inspection of the Mountain Province in company with Colonel Edward L. Munson, United States army.

General Wood in his communication says: "I have always been very much concerned about the economic development of these people. In the course of 2,000 years they have been able to reclaim from their mountains a limited area of land to which water can be brought. In past years feudal strife between settlements and tribes, as well as a very high death rate, prevented undue increase in population. "However, with the restoration of law and order and the development of hygiene, sanitation, services of hospitals and doctors, the population has been continually increasing without a corresponding increase of arable land. At present the mass of the population is engaged in a desperate struggle for bare existence. In the majority of districts there is not sufficient rice, and the people seek out a very meagre existence with sweet potatoes. They lack clothing, proper shelter, salt and the tools necessary in their labor. I am informed that prices for necessities in the stores throughout the Mountain Province average from 200 to 1000 percent above those that prevail in the nearby lowlands."

ORPHANS BEATEN BY SISTERS AT SALEM

Complaints Charging Assault and Battery Filed Against Women in Deaconess' Hospital—Sisters Body Bruised

SALEM, June 27.—The story of how little Allen Cory, 13-year-old orphan ward of Marion county, was last week beaten by three employees of the Salem Deaconess' hospital, all she faints, and how, on other occasions, she was locked in a room for several days on a bread and water diet, was related by her today after an investigation of several little girls' cases had been made by both city and county officials.

At the request of Chief of Police Firtchet, who had been probing charges for several days, District Attorney John Carson, Sheriff Oscar Bower, Deputy District Attorney Paine, County Judge Busby and the chief yesterday interviewed, individually, the county wards who perform the drudgery at the hospital. Today the chief again questioned the little girls and this afternoon filed a suit and battery charges against Mrs. Martha Keener, Miss Anna Dickson, sisters employed at the institution, and Frank Wedel, another employee of the Deaconess hospital.

An almost unbelievable story of maltreatment at the hands of certain hospital employees was related to Chief of Police Firtchet and news paper men this morning, after the little Cory girl and Miss Theima Perry, another ward, had been assured that, if they told the truth, they would be given protection.

"Why were you whipped?" the little Cory girl was asked. "They said I used slangs—that I was teaching other girls slangs," she explained.

"How long were you beaten?" "I don't know. My nose was bleeding and I yelled that I was fainting. Finally I did."

Held By Attendant

The little girl explained that she had been held by Frank Wedel while "Sisters" Martha and Anna used the rubber hose. The beating took place in a shed near the hospital. Today—nearly a week after the fogging was administered—the little girl's left cheek was black and blue and her jaw was swollen.

Charge Is Brandled False

County Judge Busby branded as false the charges made by the Cory child against the three employees of the hospital.

"The entire affair is a fabrication and a frameup," declared Judge Busby in his statement. "The facts in the case are that the Cory child is intractable and has caused an end of trouble. Only recently she engaged in a fight with one of the nurses and it was then that Frank Wedel was called to subdue the child."

Judge Busby said that he did not detect any injuries on the child's cheek and denied that her jaw was swollen.

TOMMY GIBBONS IS HARD HITTER

Challenger Has Every Blow Which Champion Uses Except Rabbit Punch—Uses Body Blows Frequently.

SHELBY, Mont., June 27.—Listen to a moving picture of Tom Gibbons and look over some of the blows he will go running for Jack Dempsey with on July Fourth in the Shelby "cell." Note the powerful development of the challenger.

Gibbons is the man the New York boarder commission said was too small to battle Dempsey. Yet the facts of the case are that—probably last, four pounds will separate them from flapping the scales at the same point when the bell sends them off over the route. Dempsey will weigh 185. Gibbons will weigh 134. Gibbons will have one-quarter of an inch advantage in height with his six feet one inch.

As to punches the only thing different Dempsey will have that Gibbons isn't a master at using is the rabbit punch. The champion has resorted to the deadly wallop to the base of the brain at the back of the neck in most of his fights. The rabbit punch isn't a fighter's—but it is a stroke toward an eventual finish.

Gibbons' reply to the question of how he will battle the Marquis of Hell is—"How I will fight, Dempsey decides all together on how Dempsey fights me." This would indicate that Gibbons may make Dempsey lead to him. When Dempsey fought Jess Willard he fought the big fellow, drew a lead and stopped back. Willard missed him a mile. Dempsey whirled and such a right to the heart and a left to the chin in the twinkling of an eye. To be exact Willard never hit Dempsey once during that bloody first round. When Dempsey met Carpentier he let the Frenchman start first. Carpentier started with a right left to the head. The rest of the round was a boxing match with Dempsey's machine.

in the bridge of the Frenchman's nose and scuffing both his cheeks.

The usual style of Gibbons is to start mixing from the first bell. He goes all the way across the ring to meet an opponent if necessary. In the coming battle Gibbons may not do this. He knows that Dempsey will be far more dangerous for four rounds than he will be for the other eleven. Gibbons advances set to shoot with either hand. His left jab is the fastest bling ever tied on to a heavyweight. His right upper cut carries a terrific amount of steam back of it.

The hardest Gibbons ever hit a man was Sergeant Ray Smith. Tom literally lifted the sergeant out of the ring with a right upper cut to the point of the chin. The fellow fell like a stone. It was ten minutes before he regained consciousness. This was the longest ten minutes Gibbons ever put in during his entire life. He feared what a hard hitter of the ring—that he knockout would prove fatal.

Gibbons is just as much of a body fighter as Dempsey. Many of his opponents have doubled up in pain and quit when stunned in the midsection. Tom Meehan, the man who holds a license over Dempsey, was vanquished this very way at the Cleveland ball park by Gibbons.

However it is the rap on the rim of the jaw that has settled most of his big battles of the yesterday. Jim Corbett jabbed John L. Sullivan blind at New Orleans. Jim Jeffries booted Bob Fitzsimmons with a left to the jaw. Tommy Burns beat his foe man slams to the head. Swing to the jaw by Willard beat Jack Johnson. And Dempsey knocked Willard down so many times people forgot to count them with drives to the jaw. Yet the body blows play their part. Stomach punches pull down the guard leaving a clear spot for the button on the chin.

Gibbons isn't a hotel lobby fighter. He doesn't take a pencil and paper and figure what he'd do in the ring if Dempsey does so and so. Gifted with a hair-trigger mind he solves problems as they come up in the actual battling. When he gets in there July Fourth he'll fight a hybrid Gibbons battle. And so far as he always solved his problems in a battle with himself. If Gibbons is a champion Dempsey—then the Missouri River isn't muddy.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—In no region of the body is the removal or correction of abnormal pathologic conditions more necessary than in the stomach, declared Dr. J. Shelton Horsley of San Francisco, in an address here today before the section on obstetrics and abdominal surgery at the twenty-fourth annual convention of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Horsley emphasized the bearing of secretions of the stomach upon the growth of the ulcers. In fifty-six operations made to relieve this affliction by Dr. Horsley, there have been forty-four successful recoveries and only three fatalities, all of which occurred during the first twelve cases.

SWEDEN TO HELP U. S. CELEBRATE 4TH

GOTHENBURG, Sweden, June 27.—Commemoration of the fact that Sweden was the first country to sign a commercial treaty with the United States after their independence had been won, will take place in Gothenburg this year at the first Swedish celebration of the Fourth of July, the festivities marking the culmination of "Sweden-America week" which is a feature of the Tercentennial Jubilee to Sweden.

Exposition now being given here. About 5,000 visitors from America are expected to participate in the festivities. This festival will be honored by the presence of the King and the Crown Prince of Sweden.

A historical fact of significance to Americans will be recalled at the unveiling of a statue of Gustaf III, one of Sweden's most famous kings. He showed great sympathy for the cause of the American colonies during the Revolutionary War, and after the war was over, it was he who authorized the signing of the new republic's first treaty of commerce and amity with any nation, even antedating England in recognition. The new statue is a gift from American citizens to Sweden.
