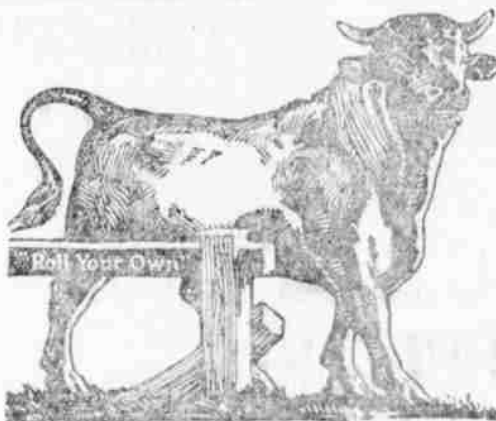

MANY INTERESTED IN FOX FARMING

Local People Hold Stock in Alaskan Fox Farm and Are Interested in Production of Fur

A large number of local people who are interested in the fox farm on Anguilla Island in Alaska, will doubtless be interested in the article which recently appeared in the Fur Trade Review. Quite a number of local residents hold stock in the fox farm on Anguilla Island and have an interest in the industry which is growing rapidly throughout the country, particularly in Alaska. The article mentioned follows:

Blue fox farming in Alaska is confined principally to islands ranging in size from 10 to 500 acres, lying along the southern coast, east and west of Cook Inlet, reports a representative of the biological survey, United States department of agriculture, who made a recent trip of investigation to Alaska. Some of these islands are near the mainland, others 100 miles or more from it. Many of them are timbered and have an abundant vegetation, but others are barren or grow only shrubbery.

White and blue foxes are not different species, but merely two-color phases of the same fox. The white is the normal winter coat of one phase, and in summer the coat of the white fox is brown and tawny. The fox, which is dark bluish gray or milky in winter and rusty gray and brown in summer is an abnormal representative of the same species. Most of the time blue foxes in Alaska have come from the Pribilof Islands or from Siberia. Farmers may have from three pairs to 20, but an island carrying more than 100 pairs is rare.

The number of pups raised per breeding pair per year is very difficult to determine. The majority of breeders seem to think they raise four or five to a litter, but as the foxes run wild on the islands and their dens are only found by chance, an exact count cannot be taken. A breeding pair is worth from \$250 to \$300. Some breeders sell 20 to 30 pairs in a season, but the majority of ranchers make most of their money from the sale of hogs. A first-class pair is worth from \$150 to \$200. The highest-priced pairs are those of a dark milky color, with curled and carrying a high percentage of guard hairs.

WILL CALL TAX MEETING SOON

Effort Will Be Made to Reimburse Tax Burden So That All Will Have Equal Share

SEASIDE, June 29.—An appointment of the tax collection committee for the thirty-five Oregon counties, other than Multnomah county, as provided for under an act of the last legislature, will be made in the next week, it was stated by the Oregon Finance yesterday.

Immediately following these appointments the committee plans to call a conference in Seaside to call of the 25 counties representatives at which ways and means for equalizing the tax burden will be discussed.

If there were a 10 cent tax on Opium sold to eat, it would be a good thing, but I have said and will maintain that the tax burden can be so distributed that it would be a good thing for the state and the people.

It is proposed that the state tax on liquor be increased from 10 to 15 cents per gallon and that the tax on beer be increased from 5 to 10 cents per gallon.

Collection of interest and installment payments on the various counties of the state and territory will be made and reported to the state and federal government.

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NEW DRUG BILL TO BE INTRODUCED

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PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—Plans for the introduction of an anti-liquor bill the next session of the Oregon legislature are already being made by the members of the State White Cross organization.

At a recent session of the White Cross here the proposed bill was reviewed, with the hope expressed that the passage will limit the traffic in liquor and do away with the sale of morphine.

The bill was introduced at the meeting and that during a given length of time five years ago there were only five drug addicts arrested in Portland, while during the same length of time last year several hundred were taken into custody.
