punches at the bell.

Round Five

Dempsie was bleeding from the old wound over the left eye. Dempsie missed a left to the body as they fell into a clinch. Gibbons missed two light lefts to the head. Dempsie missed a left and Tom attached. Gibbons hooked two lefts to the head and the crowd cheered. Gibbons landed a third left without a return. Dempsie missed the shot-lever with a right and left to the head and called him with a split right to the jaw, forcing him to clinch. Gibbons danced away from the Dempsie to follow him. Tom missed a left to Dempsie's face. Dempsie landed a right to the body and Gibbons a left to the head. Dempsie shot a left to the head and Gibbons did the same. Gibbons landed a left to Dempsie's eye.

Round Six

Dempsie's left was short in a clinch and Referee Langhorne was forced to go between them. Gibbons danced away from Dempsie's head. In the clinch Dempsie hit Tom on the chin with short right. Gibbons ducked a left and his head went through the top rope of the ring. Dempsie called him back on the toe and the crowd booed. Then traded lefts to the head before Gibbons. Gibbons missed a left to the chin. Dempsie hooked a right and left to the body. Gibbons shot a left to the new on his side and shot a left to the body. Gibbons called the attention with a left back to the chin when the round ended.

Round Seven

Dempsie drove a right to the body and a left to the jaw. As Gibbons came in the champion hooked him with a right to the chin. Gibbons hung on and backed away after the breakaway. Dempsie swung another right to the jaw and Gibbons hooked him with a left at the chest. Gibbons ducked a left to the head. He backed away from a hard right swing. In the clinch Dempsie bested Gibbons right and left to the challenger's body and head. Gibbons backed into the ropes to escape punishment. He attempted to be weakly under Dempsie's average body attack.

Round Eight

Gibbons missed two lefts and Dempsie hooked a left to the chin. In the clinch they exchanged punches to the head. Gibbons whipped over two lefts to the head. Dempsie landed a left to the head and Gibbons ducked a left to the head. He called back on the same spot in a clinch. Dempsie ducked Gibbons with a left to the head. Gibbons landed a right and hooked Dempsie high on the head with a left. Gibbons swung a right to Jack's chin. As they clinched Dempsie brought short rights and lefts to Tom's face.

Round Nine

Dempsie landed and Gibbons backed away. Following into a clinch Jack was short with a left. Tom danced away from the left hand left and exchanged lefts with Dempsie. Gibbons landed a light left to the body in the clinch. Gibbons was trying to be a target for the champion. Jack hooked a left to the nose and Gibbons drove a left to Dempsie's chin as they clinched. Dempsie hooked two lefts to the head. Gibbons swung two lefts and a right to Dempsie's head. They exchanged lefts. Dempsie drove Gibbons to the ropes. Gibbons hooked the champion with a right and left to the head and hooked his left in to the champion's chin.

Round Ten

Gibbons landed a light left to the head. Dempsie hooked his left to Tom's jaw, forcing him to back away. Jack drove him into the ropes with a right punch to the head. Dempsie was short with a left hook, but hooked him with a right to Tom's body, missing his clinch. Gibbons shot a right into the champion's body and received two lefts to the head. A third left just missed Tom's chin. Dempsie missed a right hook with a left to the head. Gibbons was short with a left and had the champion hooked into the ropes ready for a right swing when the bell stopped them.

Round Eleven

Gibbons ducked a left to the head. He swung a right into Dempsie's head. The crowd called with a left hand to the chin and traded lefts to the head and head in return. Gibbons landed over three times on the left hand and swung three right lefts to the head. Dempsie hooked him with two lefts. Dempsie missed a right and brought over another left against the chin. Gibbons shot the jabber and swung the side of the ring to swing. They traded lefts to the head. Gibbons shot a right into the head and they clinched.

Round Twelve

Gibbons tried to find with a left and they clinched. They exchanged lefts to the body at close range. Gibbons danced away from a left
