MAKE IMPROVEMENTS AT DIAMOND LAKE

Forest Service Officials Complete Survey of Camp Grounds on East Lake Shore—Hotel Now Being Built.

Walter Love, forest examiner on the Umpqua National Forest has returned from a trip to Diamond Lake in company with F. W. Cleator, Forest Service recreation engineer for Washington and Oregon. The trip to the lake was made by way of Medford and the old John Day road from Union Creek. While at the lake, Cleator and Love made a topographic map of the three mile camp ground on the east shore of the lake, paying particular attention to the sources of water supply. Active construction of a hotel and gasoline service station is being carried on by the Diamond Lake Improvement Company, which has the concession for the resort at the lake. By present transportation routes, Diamond Lake is 30 miles by road from Medford, 94 miles from Klamath Falls and 100 miles from Bend. It is 99 miles from Roseburg by the North Umpqua Trail.

A lookout tower for fire protection purposes is to be erected this summer on the summit of Mount Bailey, which lies immediately west of Diamond Lake and is one of the highest peaks in the Umpqua Forest. The material for this house was cut out in Roseburg, the pieces numbered according to their location in the building, bundled and shipped by freight to Medford, whence they will be carried by truck to Diamond Lake and carried on mule back the fourteen miles to the top of the mountain.

NEW MANAGER FOR STATE CHAMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—(Special.)—A. S. Dudley, of Sacramento, said to be one of the best Chamber of Commerce men in the United States, has been selected an executive manager of the Oregon state Chamber of Commerce, beginning August first.

The board of directors of the state chamber authorized the appointment of a highly-trained organization man as a step in the state-wide development program to be undertaken jointly by the Portland and state chambers. Dudley was selected by a committee of the directors composed of E. R. Hall of Klamath Falls, L. E. Vining of Astoria and Roy T. Bishop of Portland.

The new state chamber executive will devote a major part of his time to the state outside of Portland, particularly along the lines of co-operative marketing and the general strengthening and betterment of agricultural conditions, according to state chamber officials. This line of work is one in which Dudley is particularly well qualified, and it is well in line with the state-wide development program for which a fund of \$200,000 is now being raised in Portland.

Dudley was formerly an assistant secretary of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, and for the past three years secretary-manager of the Sacramento chamber. Under his supervision the Sacramento chamber has developed into one of the leading development organizations of California and recognized nationally as a model of its kind.

J. W. Hickey, general secretary of the state chamber, will be retained in his present position.

VACATION SCHOOL STARTS

The daily vacation Bible school of the Christian Church will open at the church on Monday morning, at 9 o'clock. 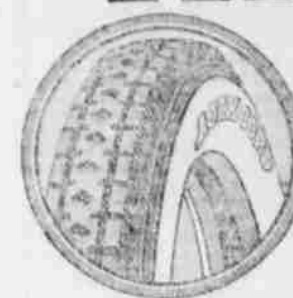

ENGINEER KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

TACOMA, July 6.—The monster Union Pacific locomotive number 2319 which on July 4 drew President Harding's special train into Portland for a week just outside of Tacoma today. The train which was due at Tacoma at 4:40 a. m. left Portland at 11:15 last night and ran into a landslide just before reaching Nelson Bennett tunnel. The train was crowded with persons enroute for the Tacoma festivities in honor of President Harding who arrived this morning.

Engineer Roddy was scalded to death when the steam pipes burst, after the engine had turned on its side. W. C. Watson, the fireman, was badly scalded, and J. W. Pynchon, conductor and H. Munson baggageman were injured. The first baggage car

was demolished and the first coach was wrecked, but the passengers managed to escape. It is possible that one or more tramps were killed in the wreck.
