

TITLED MARRIAGES ARE GROWING SCARCE

Women Who Acted as Professional Matchmakers Now Find Commissions Few and Far Between.

BERLIN, July 5.—(A. P.)—International matchmakers, the men and women who used to do a thriving business marrying off titles and high social positions to wealthy heiresses, have been hard hit by the war and the resultant financial distress. Marriages among humbler folk all over Europe has increased under the distress, but not so with the leaders of fashion.

June, the month of weddings, has not produced the large number of city weddings which always characterizes the month in pre-war days. This is especially noticeable in central Europe. In Germany, churches, hotels, cafes, dressmaking shops, jewelry shops and flower shops do not show the old-time June activity.

Foreign tourists are not visiting central Europe in large numbers, and the residents of central Europe are not traveling abroad. The romances which used to begin on ocean trips are fewer and fewer. American and English women with comfortable fortunes are not wandering about as they did in old times. Travel is not so inviting as it used to be, and families from the lands of good exchange apparently have little desire to expose their daughters to the sort of travel which has grown out of the many international marriages recently. Titles which carry with them bankrupt estates are apparently at a great discount. The uncertainty of titles to baronial possessions makes ambitious mothers hesitate. They have seen too many penniless princes and counts and barons rattling about Paris and other European capitals, trying to market their family tree.

But the professional matchmakers have not yet given up hope and are still active. Vienna has a number of such matrimonial agents who are hard at work, and with the revival of Vienna which has come about as the result of foreign assistance, their opportunities are improving. Vienna's old gaiety is coming back. Its fashionable attract foreign women, and music lovers flock to its opera. Tourists who visit Italy also go to Austria in large numbers.

In Berlin commercial matchmakers are having a harder time. The decline in travel and upset political conditions work against them to a greater degree than in any of the other Euro-

pean capitals, and the failure of war husbands to pass away makes it difficult to do anything with principles who were enemies in the great struggle.

One professional marriage agent, a titled woman who was once a great success in her profession, is constantly seen about the prominent hotels in Berlin and she has not lost her ability to meet nearly all promising visitors. But she has collected a commission only once in the last twelve months.

The agents which advertise extensively and arrange marriages on a strictly business basis, without social considerations, are doing far better than the agents who specialize in aristocratic. Throughout central Europe the daily papers are filled with the advertisements of marriage agencies which describe the clients in great detail, give their financial status and requirements, leaving only the names unmentioned.

ARM-POWERED PLANE IS BUILT

War Aviator Predicts They Soon Will Be Common as Bicycles

FLAPS WINGS LIKE BIRD

Pilot Strapped to Bat-Like Machine Horizontally; Does Guiding With His Head

PARIS, July 5.—Hand propelled airplanes shaped like birds and only slightly larger than a man will be as common as bicycles within a few years, in the opinion of J. C. Roch, a French war aviator who is now testing out such an invention.

Roch believes the trend of airplane style is away from the enormous planes with heavy motors, to lighter and smaller types. He points out that planes with seven and ten horse power motors already have proven successful. Utilizing the gliding principle and the principle of the flapping wings of a bird, Roch has fashioned a plane which will be hand propelled—that he believes will be the airplane of the future.

Roch's present model has the appearance of a big cat with outspread wings made of aluminum and a framework of light wood.

Pilot Horizontal. The pilot is strapped in a horizontal position under the wings, corresponding to the body of the bat. The wings, which are hinged and flap in a birdlike fashion, are operated by the arms. The feet control the rudder which regulates the elevation of flight while a simple string apparatus attached to the head of the pilot regulates direction of flight.

"I have tried as far as possible to imitate the flight of birds," Roch explained. "Hitherto man really never has flown because he hasn't been able to perfect the flapping wings. I believe I have solved that difficulty."

In order to avoid unnecessary danger in testing out the bicycle plane Roch has fixed up a long track, from which the plane is suspended. Trial flights under this arrangement have proved successful, Roch says, and after he has made a few more corrections of balance and control in the plane Roch plans to test it thoroughly in open flying.

Won't Be Tiresome. "To fly like that will not be any more fatiguing than to swim," Roch explained. "Remember the wings will not have to be flapped continuously, but only enough to maintain altitude and control adverse winds."

Roch's present model also is equipped with a three-horse power motor which operates a propeller. This he plans to use only for the takeoff and to obtain initial altitude. Eventually he is hoping even to do away with this motor.

Each constructed twenty models before he finally was successful. The last one cost him less than \$100. When perfected and made in large quantities the plane undoubtedly could be sold for less than half that amount.
