TELL OF OLD HAPPENINGS

Sixteenth Century Collection of Letters Recently Discovered in Austrian National Library.

A sixteenth century collection of some 35,000 letters, which has just been discovered among the treasures of the Austrian National library, provides a sample of the raw material from which histories are written that is of more than usual interest. The collection, it appears, was made by one Count Philip Fugger, of the great House of Fugger, in Augsburg, the Fuggerei representing the "Rothschilde" of the Reformation period. This house employed correspondents in almost every country, by whom copies of private letters containing news or entertaining gossip were obtained to be retailed to the public. Included in these letters is one giving a full account of the defeat of the great Spanish armada, with a description of the effect it produced in Spain. Another is a dispatch from one of Drake's captains. Something more than 200 of the letters, well selected, have been reprinted by a Vienna publishing firm.

A Little Goes a Long Way.

The research in radium and the X-ray is being carried forward constantly, much to the benefit of humanity at large. Although the price of radium averages in the neighborhood of \$100,000 a gram, and a gram is only about one five-hundredth of a pound, the use of radium has been extended into dozens of different fields.

The layman is likely to wonder how radium can be used to illuminate the hands of watches and clocks when the cost of the material is so high. The fact is that it requires only a microgram of radium, mixed with zinc sulphide crystals, so to cover the hands of a number of watches that they will be luminous for years, and a microgram is but a millionth part of a gram.

Child Labor in China.

Women and children are especially cheap in China, says Miss Tak-hing Shin, a welfare worker of Hong Kong, who is now in Europe studying conditions. In China there are 400,000,000 people, with only 4 per cent literate, and they die off by thousands, she asserts. When a child is a week or two old she is taken by her mother to the factory, laid in a corner, and fed at intervals. If she survives, in a year or two she toddles about among the machines. At four or five she learns the rudiments of the work, and at six or seven she is an adept, taking her place in the ranks of regular workers. They work from 12 to 16 hours a day.

Sheep Outlook in New Zealand.

The 1923 outlook for sheep in New Zealand is about 30 per cent below 1922, since more than 3,700,000 sheep and 5,150,000 lambs were killed during the calendar year 1922. The quantity and quality of lambs has been affected by adverse weather conditions. However, the high price of wool is causing farmers to keep their sheep now, and the 1923 estimates of killings are considerably below last year, according to a cable from Consul Karl de G. Mac-vitty, Auckland, N. Z.

To Sound Deep River Reach.

A special survey will undertake to sound the Deep River Reach of the Ottawa river in Canada. In several places in the space of twenty-three miles 5,000 feet of towboat line has failed to find bottom. Lake Superior, the deepest of the great inland seas, attains a depth of about a thousand feet.—Youth's Companion.

TO UNITE TWO CONTINENTS

Pan-American Railroad Is a Stupendous Project Which Is Apparently Near Realization.

The time is approaching, and will come sooner than most people expect, when it will be possible to travel in comfort by rail from New York, Chicago or San Francisco to Brazil, Santiago or Buenos Aires, by the Pan-American railroad. This great north and south line is a stupendous project, observes the Scientific American Magazine.

The scheme in its entirety involves large figures and heavy costs, the total length of the line being 10,116 miles, which is not so very far short of the combined length of the three shortest of our transcontinental systems. It should be understood that the enterprise does not, and never did, contemplate the building of an entirely new system of that length; for much of the route is made up of already existing stretches of national railroads. Taking New York as a starting point, the line runs to the Mexican frontier, and from thence through Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia and Argentina, to Buenos Aires.

Even today it is possible to travel by railroad from New York to the frontier of Guatemala; but from Guatemala to the Canal zone over half of the line has yet to be built. The longest stretch of uncompleted line is from the Canal zone to the boundary line between Peru and Bolivia, where, out of a total of 3,362 miles, only 542 miles have been completed. Also there is a stretch of 127 miles in Bolivia in which work has recently been commenced. The line from Bolivia to Buenos Aires, a distance of 1,030 miles, has been completed. To date 5,500 miles out of a total of 10,116 miles have been built.

GREEN DYE FROM CORN COBS

Science Has Added Another Achievement to Its Record in Use of Raw Material.

Science has found a way of utilizing all corn cobs, short or long, in the manufacture of various chemicals. As the corn cob consists of cellulose, which is valuable for making many products, such as celluloid and paper, it is considered desirable to save the substance of the cob. The furfural, therefore, is taken from the extract which is obtained by boiling the cob in water and the cellulose can thus be kept for other purposes.

This liquid is employed for many purposes in industrial chemistry, and can be so treated that it will yield a bright green dye, which is much liked by women of fashion, says the Detroit News.

Sitting beside him on the marble rim of the pool, she gave politics the very old device. 'Politics are un-manned,' she ended, swinging her legs glibly in the water, 'and every man has his price. He lets the world know it, too.' 'The politician glanced sideways at the society lady in her ultra bathing dress. Then he said: 'Well, every woman has her figure, and she doesn't mind letting the world see it, either.'"

CHICAGO, July 18.—An ant eater that uses his tail for a parasol when it is not sweeping ants into a pile for eating was brought back by Edmund Heller, a naturalist, from the jungles of South America.

Among other specimens obtained by Heller was a rapt, similar to a rat, and the only animal of the kind ever brought here alive; a bird that is much valued for its oil for cooking and medicinal purposes; many specimens of the howler monkey, vampire bats and birds.

Bungalow Decoration Gives Free Rein for Originality and Taste

Some houses permit amateur interior decorators to exercise a greater range of personal taste and more originality than others. Period houses impose the limitations of appropriate furnishings, but a type such as the bungalow, makes the proper atmosphere for the bungalow. They give an opportunity also to strike the color keynote of the tinted furnishings. The informal and natural tone is further emphasized in the window curtains which are best if of heavy
