BURNED IN FIRE

PORTLAND, July 18.—Searching through the ruins of the \$100,000 fire which last night destroyed the Pacific planing mill and several nearby buildings, authorities today discovered a body believed to be that of Andrew Eagle, the day watchman, who had been sleeping at the mill plant. Identification could not be made, although it is known that Eagle slept in the mill last night and has not been seen since the fire. Frank Wire, the night watchman, had not been located this morning. The flames were fought by all available equipment and the roofs of five nearby residences were burned.

EUGENE GIRL HURT IN AUTO SMASHUP

EUGENE, July 18.—Janet Fraser, 22-year-old Eugene girl, lies dangerously injured in the Mercy hospital as the result of the severing of the external jugular vein and several arteries in her neck, caused when the car in which she was riding struck a telephone pole on Fairmont boulevard yesterday afternoon, about 5 o'clock, splintered glass from the broken windshield entering her neck. Doctors last night said Miss Fraser had a fighting chance to recover.

Pleeky work on the part of Mrs. Frank Gilstrap, who was a passenger in the auto, coupled with splendid driving on the part of the Eugene ambulance driver, combined to save Mrs. Fraser from death from loss of blood. Mrs. Gilstrap, seeing blood spurting from the young woman's neck, held the vein partially closed until the ambulance could arrive with a doctor. In the record-making time of two minutes.

Whether Miss Fraser will live depends, doctors said last night, on how well she is able to stand the shock and the tremendous loss of blood. A blood transfusion was made soon after the accident. She retained consciousness throughout and was said last night to be resting well at the Mercy hospital.

ST. PAUL, July 18.—Senator Fleet Magnus Johnson, of Minnesota, joined Senator Brookhart of Iowa, in a demand that a special session of Congress be called to "save the wheat farmer from ruin by low prices." Johnson also announced that he is considering a calling of conferences of wheat state congressmen to consider economic relief for farmers.

"Thousands of farmers face utter ruin as a result of dropping wheat prices," Johnson said. "Something must be done quickly or else there will be no more grain farmers."

He believes that the American farmer should be protected by a wheat embargo, owing to the abundant crops of Canada and foreign countries.
