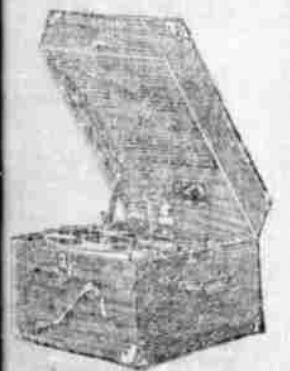

FOREST FIRE FILM TO BE SHOWN HERE

"The Red Enemy" a forest protection picture, which is being distributed by the U. S. Forest Service, and which is to be shown at the Antlers theatre here on July 22-23, under the auspices of the Umpqua National Forest service, is declared to be one of the best films in circulation on forest protection.

Robert E. Smith, president of the Lumbermen's Trust Company, of Portland, and for many years a strong advocate of forest fire prevention, has said the following to officials of the Western Forestry and Conservation Association and the U. S. Forest Service about the film:

"I think by all odds it is the greatest stroke of educational work which you have attempted and it not only brings home to western people a striking realization of the dangers and economic loss occasioned by forest fires, but in addition, it creates good will for the fire protection agencies. To use the phraseology of the silver screen it is graphic and gripping. From a technical standpoint I think the things that stand out prominently are the human interest in the film and the fact of an enlightened self interest. The whole conception and execution of the film were so excellent that I could not refrain from congratulating each of you most sincerely upon your achievement."

ROSEBURG GIVEN FINE PUBLICITY

The July issue of "The Volt" the monthly publication of The California Oregon Power Company, made its appearance today. In this issue the company announces its purchase of the Douglas County Light and Water company holdings, and devotes four pages to publicity material concerning the city. The first page is given over to a recital of the negotiations which culminated in the purchase of the Douglas County system, and the plans for the organization of the Umpqua district and the technical side of the proposed improvements.

The remainder of the space is given over to an exploitation of the resources of Roseburg and the Umpqua Valley, and some of the early history of the community, in order that the friends of the company may become better acquainted with the city in which now holdings have been acquired. The article is illustrated with a double page of Roseburg, cuts of the Umpqua Hotel, Winchester Power plant, office and sub station and the Kohlhaugen apartment house.

CAULIFLOWER LAND IN SUBURB WORTH \$5,000 PER ACRE

For 24 years, J. M. Teague, California's foremost cauliflower expert, has been turning out strings of cars of cauliflower as regularly as clockwork from the well-known Slauson ranch—now a city suburb. In the old days this famous old ranch was considered an admirable farm land. No one then ever dreamed the day would come that the lease of the 600-acre property would be growing cauliflower right by the side of other lands selling rapidly for \$5,000 per acre and upwards. Nor would one have ever dreamed five years ago, that right in the big cauliflower ranch a million-dollar Goodyear rubber tire plant would be built. RECORD IS MADE AT CRATER LAKE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—The tourist season at Crater Lake opened this year with a very large increase in tourists, who came from California and from all the states in the union, as well as the provinces in Canada, according to John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, who has just returned from an extended trip through southern Oregon and northern California, including a visit to Crater Lake National park. In the first 15 days of the season there was an increase of 75 per cent in tourist arrivals, approximately 10,000 visiting the park in that time, compared with 6,000 last year.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR GROUP GATHERING

The second annual "group gathering" for rural Sunday schools in the Roseburg district will be held in the beautiful oak grove about one mile north of Dillard on Sunday, July 22nd. These gatherings are held under the auspices of the American Sunday School union, with Gordon C. Griffin, missionary, in charge. Mr. Merle Austin of the Green Sunday school, is president of the local organization, and several committees have been appointed for Sunday's service.

The morning service will begin at 10 o'clock with a song service and special music. An out-of-door Sunday school is being planned to begin at 10:30, the audience being divided into classes and taught by teachers who have already been selected. The subject of the lesson is "John the Apostle," found in Luke 9:49-56; John 19:25-27; 1 John 4:7-8. "About forty minutes will be allowed for the discussion of the lesson. After the assembling of the classes, songs and exercises will be rendered by Sunday school pupils, after which Rev. Shiras of Ten Mile will deliver an address.

The noon hour provides an enjoyable time, when the basket dinners are spread out in comfortable places about the grove. A committee will prepare and serve hot coffee to those who wish it.

The afternoon session will open with special music by the Bible school orchestra of the Roseburg Christian church, followed by a song service. Missionary Griffin will speak of the local Sunday school work including a statistical report. Senator B. L. Eddy of Roseburg will give the afternoon address. No one should miss this message who is interested in what the Book has to say. Mr. Eddy spoke at the McRae Grange Gathering last Sunday, to an audience of about one thousand persons.

A cordial welcome is extended to all Sunday schools and people.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS MEET

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 20.—Law enforcement officials from all of the western states, Alaska, British Columbia and Alberta are making preparation to attend the four-day conference of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police, starting July 23 and ending July 26, President Harding's day.

Every law enforcement official—sheriffs, judges, prosecuting attorneys, chiefs of police, federal agents, and criminologists—comprise the membership of the association, officially organized to work out means for more effectively combating crime through the adoption of new methods of criminal investigation and procedure, and to work for greater respect of law.

It is expected that over 400 law enforcement representatives will be present.

The following subjects will be discussed at the convention and definite

plans for the fall opening of the association's college of criminology will be formulated; "International Criminals"; "Lift Traffic in Narcotics and Liquor"; "Uniform Records, Circulars and Systems for Identification"; "Causes of Crime"; "Crime Prevention Measures"; "Remedies for Present Procedure"; "New Criminal Types"; "Canadian and U. S. Pardon and Parole Systems"; "Automobile Theft Prevention."
