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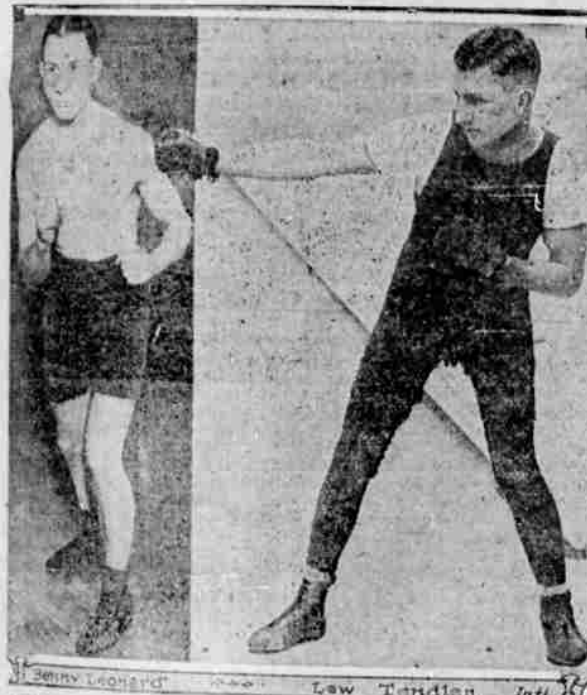

Champion Comes to Worst Hazard



NEW YORK, July 21.—When Benny Leonard and Lefty Lee Tendler, Philadelphia challenger, climb into the ring at the huge Yankee Stadium tomorrow night followers of both will experience a thrill of trepidation. Leonard, world's lightweight champion, has more to lose, it is true, but Tendler occupies a position almost on par with that of the title holder. A decisive defeat of either may mean the retirement of the victim from ring affairs—if it does not lead to a return engagement.

Better rivals for years, these two outstanding lightweights have clashed only once. That was a no-decision battle in Jersey City last summer. Leonard retained his crown, and carried off the popular decision, but Tendler gained prestige even in defeat. He carried the champion along at a terrific pace for twelve rounds and the latter's margin of victory was nothing to boast of.

In many quarters the report has been circulated that Leonard has "come back." Never before has he trained so strenuously in an effort to determine into the ring with him. Not one whit less determined will he be. If he "knocks off" his adversary the crown worn by Leonard for more than six years is his.

A crowd of huge proportions will witness the fight. Leonard's share of the receipts, possibly \$250,000 will establish a record for earnings in a single lightweight engagement.

LABOR PARTY POLICY ONE OF SERVICE

Seeks Not to Profit Self, Asserts Leader—More Government Is Needed—Must Be Democratized

LONDON, July 23.—When labor rules Great Britain its foreign policy will be one of "mutual service," as contrasted with a policy of the deliberate pursuit of profit or self.

Sidney Webb, labor M. P. and one of the intellectual leaders of his party, holds out this promise.

Webb predicts that the labor rule for Great Britain may come in 1924, and if there is then any civilization left in Europe, the laborites will seek to pursue a "Good Samaritan" policy.

"At the root of all our present trouble is the state of warlike tension from one end to the other," Webb declared. "This is plainly the outcome of the unsatisfactory treaties by which our war was ended."

"We can all see now that Europe could no more be rebuilt upon the passion of hate, the passion of greed and the passion of fear than upon anger and violence."

"Neither hate nor greed, neither fear nor violence, is brought more into accord with the requirements of economics or of ethics merely by being national instead of individual."

"What the labor party stands for is a policy of mutual service, as contrasted with a policy of the deliberate pursuit of profit or self—it matters not whether the self to be profited be the individual at the expense of other individuals, or the nation at the expense of other nations."

"Such a policy would aim persistently and wholeheartedly at the earliest possible restoration to economic prosperity of all the nations of the world, including, as a matter of course, those with whom we were lately at war. It would make continuous for an ever-progressing common limitation of armaments. In my view, it would inspire our advocacy, within the leagues of nations, of the establishment of some practicable international currency and some uninterrupted remittances, possibly by the intermediation of the International Postal Union itself."

"I make bold to say what the world needs, is not less government but more."

"What we have always to insist on is that government should, at all points, be effectively democratized."
