GOLDEN RULE BASIS FOR CODE OF ETHICS

PORTLAND, July 24.—A code of ethics was adopted today by the Western Confectioners association. In session here, the code having as its foundation the golden rule, it declares against the giving of prizes, misleading advertising, use of punchboards, and underweight packages, and urges that candy factories and stores be clean and the workers clean and free from disease.

OREGON DIAMONDS GEMS

ASHLAND, Or., July 24.—A report received today by officials of the Hartman Shale Oil Company from the Tiffany Jewelry Company of New York, says that several diamonds which were found on the Hartman holdings east of Ashland are valuable. So far only six diamonds have been found on the shale holdings, and no attempt will be made by the Hartman company to mine them in a commercial way, officials said.

Of the six diamonds tested by Tiffany none was over two carats in size and most of them were under one carat. The Tiffany company, it is said, declared the diamonds compared quite favorably with those of the Kimberly mines in South Africa. The stones were found embedded in shale and were separated from that formation with difficulty.

A party of Rotary club members representing the clubs in Portland, Salem, and Eugene, will arrive here at noon tomorrow for a short visit in this city with the local members of the Rotary club. The exact number of visitors has not been given to the committee in charge of the entertainment, but a good representation is expected. The Rotarians are to hold an interstate meet with California Rotarians at Crater Lake.

The local club is planning an informal dinner as a reception for the Rotarians, the work being in charge of Sam Shoemaker. A program for the dinner has been arranged and will start at 6:30 tomorrow evening.

The country club has invited the visiting club members to the links for a few hours of golf. The visitors will be taken charge of, as soon as they reach Roseburg and will be escorted immediately to the links. The playing will continue until about 5 o'clock.

The program for the dinner consists of several very interesting numbers in music and reading. Miss Lorraine Conline has agreed to give a number of readings. Miss Hazel Jamet will sing two vocal solos and Miss Dorothy Cordon will give piano solos. Speeches will be made by the local members and responses, of course, from the visitors. Eighty-five covers will be laid for the dinner tomorrow night.

The visiting club will leave Thursday morning for Medford, where they will spend a short time prior to coming to the state border line to meet a delegation of Rotarians from San Francisco and other California cities. When the two parties meet the tour group will return to the city and back to Medford for the whole delegation will make the trip to Crater Lake.

FRENCH PREPARING FOR OLYMPIC GAMES

NEW YORK, July 24.—More than 5,000 athletes from all nations of the globe are going to the French Olympics and arrangements have been made to seat 100,000 spectators.

Fifty-four nations will take part in 138 events. It may be the greatest athletic carnival in the history of the world, thousands of times greater than when the Greeks used to climb over the mountain passes in the spring, taking weeks, to attend the first games on Mount Olympus.

A tennis stadium is being built, a village is being constructed to house the athletes, a musical stadium for the rowing and sailing races on the Seine, a range for long distance shooting, an arena for boxing, fencing and wrestling, and fields and stands for the rugby football matches.

The track is the largest in the world and made of red scoria, formed in two parallel lines 130 metres long. Work of the French committee has been greatly hampered by lack of money. The chamber of deputies cut the appropriation in half, but still the work has gone on and it is very probable that all the projects will be successfully completed.

The International Amateur Federation congress began discussions of the situation yesterday in Paris. Col. A. G. Miles, member of the American executive committee, is in attendance. The University of Pennsylvania has offered Franklin field, Philadelphia, for the try-outs, which are expected to begin about the first of June next year. The Harvard stadium also has been offered.

The American team will sail on June 18.

Makes Painting Easy.

A portable paint-spraying outfit, recently placed on the market, is distinguished by its compactness and lightness, weighing, with its carrying case, only about 28 pounds, so that a workman can take it along to any job where there are facilities for running it, says the Popular Mechanics Magazine. Its air compressor is driven by an electric motor which consumes about as much current as a 40-watt lamp.

KEEPING OUT INSECT PESTS

United States Inspectors Ever on the Alert to Protect Interests of the Agriculturists.

Inspectors of the federal horticultural board of the United States Department of Agriculture are continually on the alert to prevent insect pests from making their way into the United States from foreign countries, often locating them in new and unexpected places, for their ways of arrival are numerous. Twice during the month of March one inspector, in co-operation with customs officials, intercepted living larvae of the European corn borer in stalks of broomcorn contained in passenger's baggage. One interception was made from the baggage of a third-class passenger arriving from Italy, whose intention was to take the infested material to Missouri. The second discovery was made by the same inspector when the same pest was found in the baggage of a passenger from Germany.

These fortunate interceptions emphasize very forcibly the need and importance of carefully examining, in co-operation with customs officials, passengers' baggage arriving from various foreign countries. Work of this kind is now carried on by the federal horticultural board at a number of ports of entry, and as funds permit it is proposed to enlarge this phase of the board's activities.

HAVE HOMES UNDER GROUND

In One Part of France Whole Villages Have Established Themselves Beneath the Soil.

In his account of the "Retreat of the Ten Thousand," after the failure of Cyrus the Younger to capture the crown of Persia from his younger brother, Xenophon (400 B. C.) mentions a peculiar tribe living in the Armenian highlands who dwell under the ground with all their live stock. In some regions along the chalk cliffs of France one will find whole villages under ground, for the reason that the surface is valuable for vineyards. The owner digs a pit or quarry in the surface, forming a cellar, which is accessible from one side only. Then from the sides of the pit he cuts the rooms of his dwelling under the vineyard. The windows and door open into the pit, while the rock that is taken out is used for a fence.

In these chalk cliffs primitive man found shelter in caves or beneath overhanging ledges, where he also found flint for his tools. Later came the ancient Gauls to dwell in these caves, which offered homes for a large population.

7,000 Pigeon Racers.

To show the interest which has been aroused in pigeon racing, there are now more than 7,000 members of racing pigeon clubs in this country who run their lofts against their rivals regularly, says Nature Magazine of Washington, D. C. Despite unfavorable weather conditions, the birds will make rapid progress toward their home goals after they start in a race. When the wind is high and strong, they fly very close to the ground, where they are best sheltered from the elements.

Ornithological Quest.

The biological survey and the Bishop museum of Honolulu are sending a scientific expedition to explore the Hawaiian islands national bird reservation. The company will make collections and gather information concerning the bird life of the reservation, which consists of a dozen or more islands, reefs and shoals stretching westward from the Hawaiian archipelago proper for more than 2,500 miles toward Japan. The Navy department is to furnish a vessel for the use of the party.

Source of Thorianite.

It is said that the mineral thorianite, now largely used in the manufacture of mantles for incandescent gas lamps, is at present not known to occur elsewhere than in the island of Ceylon. Its discovery was due to the operations of the Ceylon mineral survey. It is exported to Europe and the United States.
