COOPERATIVE SELLING IS ON INCREASE IN OREGON

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 23.—Agricultural cooperative selling, associations recently organized in Oregon, or in course of organization, include the Malheur Cooperative Producers Association, Malheur county; Oregon Logansberry Growers' Cooperative exchange, Marion county; Central Oregon Potato Growers' association, Deschutes county; and Clackamas County Potato Growers' association, Clackamas county, reports C. J. Hurd, specialist in marketing for the entire extension service, who assisted these groups in planning organization and preparing marketing agreements and contract forms.

"These county potato associations are the beginning of what may develop into a state-wide cooperative potato selling agency," said Mr. Hurd. "They are organized under a continuous contract that is binding for three years, which may be cancelled by the grower if he desires after that length of time has elapsed. Completion of the Deschutes county associations will depend upon whether or not 75 per cent of the acreage in the county can be signed up by September 1."

"I am now drafting a marketing agreement and contract for the Clackamas county association, to be submitted to a meeting of the growers at Oregon City July 25. The organization work will begin immediately thereafter and the association will be permanently formed when 200 acres have been

signed up. This association will specialize in the production and sale of seed stock."
