THREE NINES IN NATIONAL SEEM PENNANT BOUND

Fight Expected to Involve Giants, Pirates, and Cincinnati Reds

GIANT HURLERS SHAKY

Wrecking Crew Has Rescued Them Many Times From Danger—Yank Rooters Are Confident

NEW YORK, July 26.—The same fight-to-the-finish that featured the National league pennant marathon last season will be repeated this year, if the standing of the clubs at mid-season is to be taken as a harbinger.

And to the dried-in-the-wool type of baseball fan it's going to be some battle, with the world's champion Giants pushed to the limit of the fighting "esprit de club" for which they justly have become noted.

Quite naturally the struggle for the championship centers around the New York Giants and, in the main, takes in Pittsburgh and Cincinnati. Unless all three fall into an unprecedented slump one of these clubs is going to sport the league trophy. A glance at the figures will show that it doesn't take a marvelous intellect to dope that out.

Records of games played up to mid-season show such a tangle existing among these three clubs that, for a matter of choice, it is everybody for his favorite. Whereas the Reds have found the Giants comparatively easy picking—for seven out of ten games at the conclusion of the last series, to be exact—the Pirates, on even terms with the champions, have bested the men of Morgan eight out of fourteen games. Get out the cork book and you'll find that this bit of dope will make good hash.

Past performances of these teams seem to preclude anything but a nip-and-tuck fight, with none possessing the supreme confidence of victory.

The failure of the McGraw men to possess a more comfortable lead is placed to the discredit of the pitching staff—the twirlers have been blamed for everything untoward that has happened and probably will be blamed the remainder of the season. And just as surely as the Bible proves Job should have eaten more yeast, so the National league records prove that the champions would not be enjoying even their present meager lead but for the wrecking crew headed by Kelly and Welch. This same crew has turned rubber many times and deprived opponents of games that were considered safely in the ledger.

A part that is peculiar about the tightness of the National merry-go-round is the attitude of New York Yankee rooters. It may not be a secret, but it's a fact, at any rate, that the vast majority of Yankee yellers are yapping for Pittsburgh to jump into the league lead now held by the Giants. The favoritism over the Reds may be attributed to the close fight the Pirates put up against the champs last year, when they lost by a slight margin.

This feeling is not to be placed to fear that the Giants will again make the Yankees look like sandlotters in the event of a world series. Shortly after the last Yankee-Athletic series, which turned out so beautifully for the former, I entered into conversation with the wildest type of Yank fan. Before I got the opportunity of asking the question I had all framed for him he gave me the answer, with a look like that of a movie villain who visions his dastardly design of wreaking vengeance upon the oily-haired head of our modest hero.

"Oh, boy!" he let go out of a corner of his mouth. "I wish they'd bring on those Giants now. What we'd do to them would make a homicide court case look like a bed-time story."

MEMORIAL TO HUDSON STUCK

Explorer Is Honored by Gigantic Cross, Regularly Visited by Thousands of Yukon Pilgrims.

On the north bank of the Yukon river, four miles inside the Arctic circle, stands a giant cross of granite. At the foot of the giant cross almost any day one may see some pilgrim kneeling in prayer, for this cross is in memory of Hudson Stuck, explorer and archdeacon of the Yukon.

Hudson Stuck was made dean of the Yukon in 1904, and from that time until his death two years ago he worked far from civilized trails. It was by his wish that he was buried in the native graveyard at Fort Yukon, says an exchange.

The tribes from Stephens' Village, 150 miles down the Yukon from Tanana and 365 miles south of Fort Yukon, from Birch, from Eagle, 240 miles in the other direction, and from the villages of Indians and Eskimos on the Chukchee, 300 miles to the northwest—from all these come men to offer their prayers.

INTERNATIONAL RAILROAD OPEN

(By Associated Press.) REPUBLIC, Wash., July 25.—The closing chapter in the history of the Spokane and British Columbia railroad, so far as the state of Washington is concerned, has been written, with the purchase by Ferry county of the right-of-way of the railroad from Republic to the Canadian border.

A scenic highway, through valleys and along treacherous mountains, will be constructed on the grade bought for its line by what was known twelve and fifteen years ago as the "Hot Air" line.

The Spokane and British Columbia railroad was originally planned to connect Spokane with Vancouver, B. C. Surveys were run from Spokane down the Spokane river to the Columbia and down it to its confluence with the San Poil, from which an easy grade was laid out up the beautiful San Poil valley into Canada.

Right-of-way was bought for most of the distance surveyed and north of Republic a grade was constructed and rails laid, over which train service to connect with the Canadian Pacific railroad was maintained. "An agreement with the Great Northern, which also served Republic, ended the rail service several years ago."

Ferry county paid \$2,500 for the right-of-way from Republic to the international boundary.
