ADVICE
TO THE
LOVELORN

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury:—I am a married woman of 25 and have two small girls. My husband does not want me to bob my hair although he likes it on others, and I do not want to myself, but want to do what is best. My hair is very thin and short, when I have it all braided it is about the size of my thumb. The sides are about three inches below my ears. So when I put my hair up I have to use false hair pieces. Would you advise bobbing it for a few months, or would it grow back and thicker? Please tell me what would be the best for me to do, as I do not like to see married women with bobbed hair, but if I thought it would make it grow I believe I would.

Wondering:—I am an advocate for bobbed hair for young faces, but never, never, for old faces. Unless your face is very young, do not wear your hair bobbed. You may get the

same results in a different way. If your hair is thin, and uneven, cutting is undeniably good for it. If you will follow these instructions, I am sure your hair will show a marked improvement in six months. Do not expect it overnight. Have your hair cut short, preferably at a beauty parlor so that it can be done correctly. I would have it cut about an inch shorter than the hair around your ears, which you say is three inches below your ears. This will make it the length of bobbed hair, but by curling a little, and wearing a hair net over it, it will have the same effect. Do not wear the false hair any more, even though you think you don't look well without it. Curl the hair to make it seem more abundant and less harmful than false hair, which smotherers. Around your home you may wear your hair without the net in a regular bob, as the air is good

for it. If your scalp is healthy this should be all that is necessary, with frequent washings and brushings.
