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FARMERS SEEK TO THROW OFF BRITAIN'S HOLD

Control of Tobacco Market Urged—Senator Urges Economic Freedom

REFERENCES CHARGED

Cooperative Project Is Most Important Weapon—Clash Seems to Be Very Probable.

ROSEBURG, S. C., July 30.—Two tobacco farmers who listen to an address by United States Senator E. D. Smith of South Carolina at a recent barbeque held in celebration of the success of the tobacco cooperative association in the year of marketing, have been charged with the use of economic independence.

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EXPLAINS NEW PRUNE EXCHANGE

their trade brands and pack. The new association coming in after this money had been spent would be entitled to pay a larger amount for their capital investment than the associations joining at the time of organization.

Section 7 provides that the main office will be in Portland.

Section 8. The exchange will confine itself to the marketing of dried prunes and functions incident thereto, for its members only.

Section 9 provides that the exchange shall be organized by an organization committee composed of A. B. Starbuck, Dallas; George Nemer, Roseburg; William Fryar, Yamhill; L. S. Russell, Washburn; Wash.; W. L. Taylor, Butte Falls; W. L. Allen, Dundee, and M. J. Newhouse, Salem.

Section 10 provides that the membership agreement will be effective on the signing of 75 per cent of the tonnage of dried prunes produced in Oregon and Clark county, Washington, providing this tonnage is secured previous to January 1, 1924. Estimate to be placed on the years 1920, 1921 and 1922.

Section 11 provides that on the signing of this amount of tonnage the membership agreement and marketing contract shall become irrevocable.

Marketing Contract.

Section 1. Each association agrees that it will subscribe to the common stock in the exchange and name stockholders to act for it in the exchange, and has subscribed to and agreed to abide by its by-laws and has knowledge of the same.

Section 2. In this paragraph the exchange is designated as the exclusive agent of the different cooperative associations for the selling of their prunes.

Section 3. The association agrees to deliver to the order of the exchange of the notice of the account market all prunes packed or processed by the different associations during the term of the agreement.

Section 4 provides that the agreement shall go into effect upon the mailing by the secretary of the exchange of the notice of the agreement of the association, and shall continue in full force and effect from such date and shall cover the prune crop of 1924 and the crop of each year thereafter, provided that either party hereto may terminate this agreement by written notice between March 1 and April 1 of any year beginning with 1925.

The exchange agrees to provide adequate marketing facilities to market the dried prunes of its members. It also agrees to provide the orders of its members in proportion to the estimated number of pounds each delivering association shall have to market through the exchange. It further provides that if an association's production of any order shall be so small that it could not be filled economically, then the filling of such order should go to other associations, but the amount so passed by such association would be included in the next order.

Section 5 provides that the exchange shall collect the proceeds of all sales and shall promptly transmit the same to the associations participating in the sale, after deducting the cost of making such sale, including transportation, storage, insurance, interest and other necessary cost of making the sale, an additional amount for advertising, and one per cent on the gross sale for reserve fund. The alternative for this paragraph provides that the association participating in the sale shall make its own collections and transmit to the exchange the estimated cost of making the sale and the amount for advertising and for reserve fund.

Section 6 provides for the classification of prunes by size, variety and grade, giving the exchange the right to appoint inspectors to see that the standards are complied with, and providing that in case any association is not satisfied with the inspector's ruling he may arbitrate the matter in the following manner:

The dissatisfied association to choose one arbitrator, the exchange one, those two to choose the third. The decision of the arbitrators to be final and the loser to pay all expenses of the arbitration.

Section 8. The association agrees to deliver and pack the prunes and deliver at the earliest possible date.

Section 9. Any loss that the exchange may suffer on account of damage in transit or rejection by purchasers shall be charged to the delivering associations.

Section 10. The exchange agrees to furnish the association accounts of all kinds of sales and such further information as the association may require. It gives the association access to the books and accounts of the exchange at any reasonable hours.

Section 11 provides that members may mortgage their crops providing that such mortgage contains a clause giving the exchange the right to market such prunes in accordance with this agreement, and to pay the mortgage or pledge as much of the net proceeds therefrom as may be necessary to satisfy the mortgage.

Section 12. The association agrees that the exchange may provide a uniform system of book-keeping and auditing for its associations.

Section 13 (a) provides for injunction in case of members refusing to deliver their prunes at the order of the exchange.

Section 13 (b) provides for liquidated damages.

Section 13 (c) provides that in case of action being brought by reason of breach or threatened breach, the prevailing party shall receive cost of liquidation.

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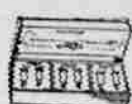

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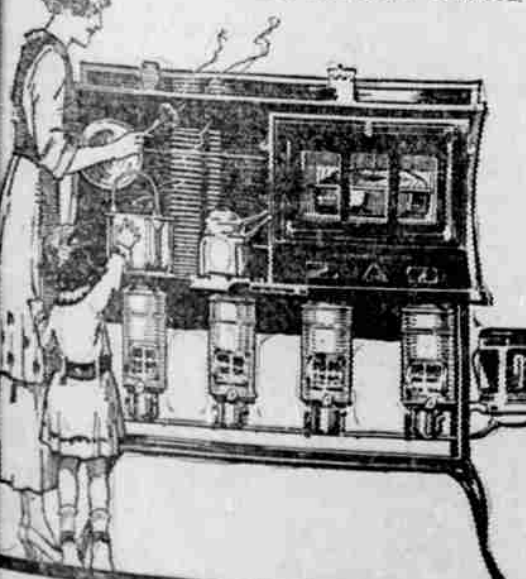
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
