CLAIMS LEAGUE MEANS DISASTER

Repression of Fighting Instinct Fatal, Says Duke in Debate

SEES DISASTER PENDING

Duke of Northumberland Says Peace Can Only Be Maintained Through Balance of Power and Strength

LONDON, July 27.—"International sophists," who, in the form of a league of nations, have set up a "brand new Tower of Babel at Geneva," are leading the world toward another great disaster, in the opinion of the Duke of Northumberland. By seeking to put a check upon the fighting instincts of mankind the league of nations is destroying, the duke asserts, the most effective instrument for preserving the civilization of the world.

Gerald Mosley, member of the British parliament, on the other hand, contends that the league of nations "is a new fire escape that has been erected to give mankind access from the burning house of civilization."

The duke and Mosley took opposing sides in a recent debate under the auspices of the London school of economics. The subject was "Will the Ape and the Tiger Ever Die?" This rather novel subject was interpreted by Viscount Ellsworth, the chairman, as meaning, "Can the fighting instincts of man be effectively and intelligently curbed?"

Opening the debate, the duke asserted emphatically that "repression of fighting instincts is as easy as falling off a log—and just as silly." China, Egypt, ancient Rome and other nations, the duke argued, curbed the fighting instincts of their citizens and never amounted to much afterward. Many of them immediately became the prey of conquerors whose fighting instincts had attained full vigor.

"Nine years ago," said the duke, "the British people had suppressed their fighting instincts so far that they were unprepared for the great war, which everyone knew was coming. The result was the greatest disaster which ever overwhelmed civilization."

"No sooner was the war over, than England proceeded to repress its fighting instincts again. Instead of erecting statues to such men as Roberts, Kitchener and Haig, we preferred to erect a monument to an American rebel named Washington. Then we proceeded to hand over Ireland to a band of murderers, instead of hanging them, and that country rapidly is sinking into barbarism."

"Fighting instincts are one of the blessings of Providence bestowed upon a nation for its defence in an evil world."

Turning his guns on the league of nations, the fiery duke characterized it as "that wretched debating society in Switzerland." The league, he said, was the result of the superficial notion that wars are caused by misunderstandings that could be avoided by nations actuated by angelic intentions. The truth is, he declared, that wars are caused by the lust for power and domination, by hatred, revenge and jealousy, and these things are inherent in human nature.

"Peace," said the duke, "can only be maintained by armed force, by a nation making itself so strong that no other nation will dare defy it. Our ancestors, not being idiots, saw this very clearly and therefore acted on the principle called the balance of power."

The British people, the duke proclaimed, have too much sense to place much faith in the league of nations. "That monument of hypocrisy and stupidity," he also attacked the "delusion" that Germany would long acquiesce in the "most humiliating peace ever inflicted upon any nation," and drew a picture of a future surprise attack by Germany that would be more terrible than anything experienced in the last war.

As a parting shot at the league the duke declared it to be the product of the "Machiavellian ingenuity of those hyphenated Americans who surrounded President Wilson."

Mosley ridiculed the stand taken by the duke, declaring that the latter was really the idealist of the subject and he the realist.

"The balance of power," Mosley said, "is the best way of creating war. The theory of maintaining peace by preparing for war has been proved a fallacy. We are now trying a new plan, exemplified by the league of nations, of preventing war where everything else has failed."

The fighting instincts of mankind can be subdued, as other primitive emotions have been, and the world will be better for it.

"The house of civilization is now on fire. We have put up a new fire escape. The duke holds that there is no precedent for using a fire escape and that it is safer to sit safely in the house and let it burn."

Mosley admitted that the machinery of the league is not yet perfect, but contended that it was being improved and that the league was making progress. "Through it man-

kind is turning an anguished face toward a new and happier order of the world," he declared.

Mr. Roberts was speeding along the highway late Saturday night, when the front tire loosened in some manner, with the result that he was thrown over the handlebars and landed on his head on the pavement. A deep scalp wound, necessitating several stitches, was inflicted over his left eye, and another gash was cut just above the eye. He was also bruised about the face and body. He was brought to the office of Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, where the injuries were given surgical attention.

MANY IRRIGATION PERMITS ISSUED

State Engineer Reports a Large Number of Permits to Residents of Douglas County—Will Develop Power

During the months of April, May and June one hundred and thirty-one permits for the appropriation of water from the various streams throughout the state of Oregon were issued by State Engineer Percy A. Capper. These permits cover the irrigation of 2,163 acres of land, the development of 15,929 horsepower, and the use of water for mining, municipal, domestic and various other purposes. The estimated cost of construction work under these permits is approximately \$425,490. During this period, permits to store a total of 5,639 acre feet of water in seven reservoirs were issued. The estimated cost of the reservoirs is \$21,746.

In Douglas county the following permits were issued: Douglas County Light and Water company for the appropriation of water from North Umpqua river for development of 2,238 horsepower.

O. Correll of Sutherlin for the appropriation of water from Calapooia creek for domestic use and irrigation of 41 acres.

W. Schroeder and F. A. Tripp of Astoria for the appropriation of water from Cow creek for irrigation of eight acres.

George Neuner, Jr. of Roseburg for the appropriation of water from Cow creek for irrigation of 40 acres.

B. E. Hayes of Glendale for the appropriation of water from McCulloch creek for irrigation of 25 acres, and domestic use.

A. F. Stearns of Oakland for the appropriation of water from Calapooia creek for irrigation of 50 acres.

Mrs. J. Mack of Myrtle Creek for the appropriation of water from a creek for domestic supply and irrigation of 20 acres.

Frank A. Davis of Myrtle Creek for the appropriation of water from North Myrtle creek for irrigation of eight acres.

W. L. Burk of Myrtle Creek for the appropriation of water from North Myrtle creek for irrigation of 15 acres.

Oregon State Game commission of Portland for the appropriation of water from Rock creek for trout hatchery.

E. R. Page of Roseburg for the appropriation of water from the South Umpqua river for irrigation of six acres.

William Andrew Barber of Days Creek, for the appropriation of water from Days creek for irrigation of eight acres, domestic supply, and operating hydraulic ram.

LOCAL MAN WINS PORTLAND SHOOT

PORTLAND, July 29.—W. H. Gordon of Roseburg and J. Blaine Troch of Portland divided honors in yesterday's registered shoot of the Sportsmen's Association of the Northwest at the Portland Gun club grounds. Gordon topped all the shooters in the first six 25-target events by breaking 148 out of 150 blue rings. J. B. Troch broke only 128 in the regular events, but won practically all the trophies and cash prizes in the handicaps.

A. P. Ingram of The Dalles, Sam Sharansky of Salt Lake, and Frank M. Troch of Portland, formerly of Vancouver, Wash., tied for second place in the 150-target event with 147 targets each. The J. S. Crane trophy went to J. Blaine Troch, who had to break 125 targets to win. Troch also won the Frank Troch \$50 cash prize by breaking 100 straight. The last two events were the tie at Friday's program, which were shot off yesterday.
