nessed the accident pulled the wrecked motorcycle off the two injured lads, and they were rushed to Roseburg. Ellison being placed in the hospital, while Austin was given medical attention and then taken home. He suffered numerous bruises and was scratched and cut considerably.

Ellison, sixteen years of age, was a student in the local high school and is well known here. He comes from one of the best known and respected families of the county and has a host of friends who grieve with the relatives in this time of bereavement. He is survived by his mother and ten brothers and sisters, nearly all of whom are residents of this county. The funeral services will be held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, from the undertaking chapel, with Rev. C. F. Morningstar of Drain officiating. The interment will take place in the Jones cemetery in Edenbower.
