From my appearance one would think I was well educated, but I'm far from it. Please tell me what I can do toward a successful future, and teaching the baby grades has been my thoughts for years.

BROWN EYES—The task that lies before you if you really care to improve your situation is not an easy one, but is one immensely worth while. As you broaden your eyes by study and work, you will find that you broaden your friendships, and increase your capacity to appreciate the better things of life. But it is not easy, and it is a work that no one can help you with, you must dig it all out for yourself. You have not enough education to teach school at all, any of the grades. To teach at all, a high school diploma, with work in teachers training is required. If possible, I would advise you to secure work in the city, where the opportunities to educate yourself are more numerous than in a town of this size. You could probably secure a position as clerk. If you do this, the rest is not so hard. There are many night schools where you could secure a good business education in a year's time. FARM NEWS

POULTRY DEMONSTRATION

Every poultryman and his wife will be interested in the culling demonstration to be held at the Nelson Brothers farm one and a half miles northeast of Roseburg.

County Agent Cooney states that it is his belief that very few poultrymen have the latest information on the science of culling the nonproducers from their flocks. Prof. H. E. Crosby of the Extension Department of the College will put this demonstration on and will explain in detail how best the work can be accomplished.

This demonstration will be put on at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon of Thursday, August 2nd, and all poultrymen and others interested in the development of this industry are invited to be present and take advantage of Professor Crosby's instruction.

BUCK AND BILLY SALE
Concerning the buck and billy sale which will be held this season, Mr. B. W. Cooney, county agent, says that the sheep and goat breeders of Douglas county are alive to the value of purebred sires to head their flocks.

Each year the county sheep and goat breeders' association stage a sale and exchange of purebred sires for the purpose of giving all the raisers of this class of livestock within the county an opportunity to obtain good breeding stock without sending out of the county.

The sale this year will take place at the Kohlhafer yards on the Dixonville road, known as East 6th street, on Saturday, August 4th. All sheep and goat breeders who wish to consign animals to this sale should have them in the yard by 10 o'clock Saturday morning.
