SYRACUSE GIRLS HATE DUMBBELLS

Requirements for Ideal Marriage Are Revealed by Questionnaire

GOOD INCOME WANTED

Two Girls Prefer Farmers and One Just Wanted the "Old Fashioned Man" — Replies Humorous

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 1.—Syracuse girls hate "dumbbells" they want to play square and go along on the fifty-fifty basis; a good income is necessary to complete love; some would tolerate "punishy" young men as husbands, but a vast majority insist upon a man without a past.

Rev. Thomas Kirkwood, pastor of the Second Reformed Church, recently issued questionnaires to the girls of his congregation, and the answers to seven questions bespeak the heart-views of the girls on what they think of the youths of today, so far as marriage is concerned.

The questions asked were:
1. Which do you consider more important in a young man, a well-trained mind or an ideal physique? Specify.
2. Would you marry a man who drank, smoked, gambled or used profane language? Why?
3. Would you marry a man who does not attend church?
4. What income do you demand? Which occupation for him do you prefer?
5. Does a man who loves children enter in to your thinking of an ideal one for marriage?
6. Would you marry a man whom you know to be impure?
7. Is religion necessary for marriage? Why?

The answers to the Rev. Kirkwood's questionnaire indicated they came from the 100 per cent modern girls.

Only one who answered the questions preferred an old-fashioned man "who does not dance or go on wild parties."

"The names of the girls who answered the questionnaire are held strictly confidential by the minister, but obvious conclusions as to such public interest and concern that Rev. Kirkwood authorized the following summary."

On the very important point "gambler or man with brain" 60 per cent preferred physique to a well-trained mind. "Give me the Adonis," said one girl.

As for drinking and gambling or related to the "ideal young man" the elements discovered that 60 per cent are enthusiastically against liquor and gambling in any form. "I'll let him play poker if he splits with me," said one of the fifty-fifty basis girls.

One girl admitted she would tolerate a "little" delinquent and gave the following reason: "Good heavens! I want a man who is not an angel, and certainly I don't believe wings sprout from any man's shoulders."

Two-thirds of the girls said they would not object to smoking and admitted they took a "puff" themselves occasionally.

Profane language was condemned by every girl who answered the questionnaire. However, one stated that if her husband became exasperated and exclaimed "Damn!" she would overlook the expression.

This religion is necessary for a happy home was the opinion of 70 per cent of the girls.

"Religion is a debt we owe to God," said one, "and without it the home lacks its most essential point."

Said another: "By all means let religion enter the home. A man should have a few rules, but he must be a believer and appreciate the environment of the Christian church."

Regarding income the girls were divided on the amount they demanded as the minimum power of a husband.

"I would be satisfied" with an income of \$12.50. Of this \$12.50 would have to be expended for a car for me," said one.

Quite to the contrary was the answer of another who said:

"For the necessities for a little family. Perhaps an income of \$200 a month. I'll say."

One girl who did not state a desired income said:

"He must have plenty."
Business and professional men, with incomes of \$200 a month, were preferred by many. "I'd like a doctor, if he would discard that professional look," said one.

Two of the girls preferred farmers. One of the two was the girl who preferred the "old-fashioned" man.

Concerning the question of fatherhood in relation to their thoughts of the "ideal young man" 15 per cent confessed that they had no thought of parenthood as a requirement, and 55

per cent declared that it must play an important part.

REMONSTRANCE ON ROAD IS FILED

loss of life, limb or property.

Indirect Outlets
"The road as proposed by the county court is very indirect as an outlet to the district served. Comparing the distances which the various classes of traffic would have to travel with the distances which would be required if a bridge were built on or near the site of the old Alexander bridge which served this district the following data is obtained:

"The average resident of Roseburg in traveling to and from this district would have to travel 1,700 feet further each way, if required to use the road rather than a bridge.

"The school children of this district would have to travel 1,200 feet further each way.

"All traffic to the south end of Roseburg which adjoins the district, and all traffic to or from the Pacific highway and points south would be required to travel more than two and one-fourth miles further each way.

Value Property Decreased
"The expenditure of so much money in the construction of the road will delay the construction of a suitable bridge, the ultimate and only adequate means of outlet to this district. The assessed valuations of the most valuable section of this district are now only 10 per cent of what they were in 1912, although in the last ten years the value of the county has increased in valuation more than 43 per cent, this increase being kept down by the vast amount of grazing land, idle land and the decreased value of logged off timber land. As a matter of fact, the most valuable section of this district would be worth more than ten times its present assessed valuation upon construction of a suitable bridge. Any act, such as the construction of the proposed road, which delays the construction of a suitable bridge, thereby causes the public to lose more than \$2,000 annually, the increased taxes which the district should pay from increased land values alone, disregarding the large amount of inconvenience which would be done if the district had any adequate outlet.

Road Unnecessary
"The road would be unnecessary if a bridge were constructed. By means of the bridge, and the paved streets of Roseburg the two ends of the road would be connected. In case the road should be desired at any time after the construction of the bridge it would be built without public expense for most of its length by the owners of the property through which it passes. When so built it would be for the purpose of a different, better and less expensive than the one proposed by this county court."

History Recited
The remonstrance continues to recite the history of the bridge controversy from the time of the collapse of the old Alexander bridge to the present time. The various schemes and projects advanced are recounted and a great deal of space taken up by a resume of the crossing proceedings which finally resulted in the city abandoning its efforts to force a grade crossing. The county court is charged with failing to fulfill its promise to construct the road, and did not press the same until the right of way which are still pending. It is also charged that when the voters were presented to consider both the road and bridge projects, that one member of the court went with them and impressed upon them every fact which could in any way be considered against the construction of the bridge at that particular site.

Petition Is Mentioned
The remonstrance continues to recite grounds for objecting to the road and says:

"Both the road and bridge cannot be built now, and while the road is not wanted, as shown, and be the several resolutions of the city of Roseburg, as filed in this matter now, and previously, the bridge is greatly desired by both the district primarily served, and by the people of Roseburg. These words throughout the county who understand the true situation have been willing to lend their influence in its favor. I here call attention to the numerous petitions on file in the county record, one of which carries more than one thousand names, petitioning this court to construct the said bridge.

In conclusion: Six years ago Union Park should have been provided with an outlet. The private loss has run into thousands of dollars; the public suffering and hardships resulting from the neglect cannot be estimated, not only the loss of years of schooling by the many children who could not get to school before the foot bridge was constructed.

"The county has lost thousands of dollars in taxes, which would have more than paid for the bridge by now

if it had been constructed when it should have been—before the old one fell. The county has spent about \$3,500 in road viewing, engineering and in the construction of the foot bridge, which the judge states has been declared unsafe. The state has surveyed and designed three bridges for the district and passed on two others.

"It seems deplorable that after this long period of time, and after such great losses, both to individuals and to the public, by reason of the lack of a bridge, that this court should ignore the desires of the people, and violate its solemn agreement with the city of Roseburg, and proceed with the expenditure of such a large sum of money on a road which would be a liability and a damage rather than a benefit.

"Any such action is the more to be condemned because the said agreement was entered into by this court after years of consideration and when fully acquainted with all the conditions and the said agreement was given wide publicity and was acted upon by many people who will be seriously damaged in the event that this court does not carry it out.

"Furthermore, the said agreement was based on sound business judgment and the fulfillment of it will benefit every taxpayer in the county. The bridge will pay annual cash dividends to the county.

"A project so greatly needed, and one desired by such a large proportion of the residents of the county should not be sidetracked because of a few trivial difficulties."
