ROSEBURG MUST BACK CANNERY

known throughout the land, no trouble should be experienced in selling the pack," he said.

J. E. McClinton stated that it is unfortunate when there is not a hearty cooperation between the county and city. "We should be able to raise not \$5000, but \$10,000 for the cannery will need that much to carry it alone," he stated. "The only way to reach the people is to make a stock selling campaign."

Royce Busenbark, who has been interested in the cannery in Roseburg for several years, made an excellent talk before the meeting. "I believe in cooperation," he said, "and am willing to work for a cooperative cannery. The wonderful growth of the Eugene cannery should inspire us for the same success can be attained right here in Douglas county. We do not want several small canneries. We want one big cannery and in the Umpqua Canning Association we have the nucleus. This season two-thirds of the bears of the county will be shipped outside because they cannot be handled here. Berries could be canned profitably and with the enlargement of the cannery you will see the increase in this crop. Cull apples and small sized oranges can be canned successfully. This cannery will be a great thing, it must be financed, but the farmers cannot do it alone."

Harry Winston, Winston grower, said, "As a grower I am much interested in the cannery and am willing to do all I can to help, to take out stock and bring in my crops."

Poster Butner stated that the small investor should be given an opportunity to obtain stock on the installment

plan and after a discussion it was said that the shares of \$100 each could be sold in four 25 per cent monthly payments.

George Neuner, Jr., who has perhaps been more interested in the cannery for many years than any Roseburg citizen, was the next speaker.

"What's the matter with Roseburg?" queried the district attorney. "Why do people in all parts of the state ask that question? The state at large realizes our superiority in quality of fruit and climate."

"They know that we are first in broccoli, prunes and other crops and yet they also know that we are last in the support of this cannery. What's the matter with Roseburg?"

"I do not look upon this cannery as a charitable institution. If a merchant can't subscribe to at least one share of stock then I say that he hasn't much interest in the city of Roseburg. The farmer is doing his share and we must do ours."

Mr. Neuner told of the formation of a cooperative cannery several years ago, which was later sold to the Rupert concern and later went into bankruptcy. He was then instrumental in organizing the Umpqua Canning Association and the articles and by-laws were so worded as to make it impossible to sell it to a private concern, therefore insuring it to be a cooperative proposition. He said that several farmers each took \$1000 in stock, showing the spirit of these men.

"There is a little town in Douglas county with a population of less than 600 willing to take this cannery and finance it. It is a shame that public mention should be made of this matter or even the intimation made that Roseburg cannot finance it. It is an institution organized primarily to help out the agricultural interests of the county. I am glad that the chamber of commerce is taking up this matter and it will show whether we have the proper spirit in this city."

The meeting passed resolutions addressed to the Roseburg Merchants Association, giving the attitude of the chamber of commerce and requested that a committee from the association be appointed to act with the chamber committee in a stock selling campaign. Charles McElhinny said that the stock selling campaign should be well organized to include the entire city.

The meeting was highly successful and will undoubtedly be the start for a bigger and better cannery in this city.

BACK FROM INDIA MISSION FIELDS

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stevens, for many years engaged in mission work in India, arrived here Monday night, and are now guests at the G. W. Kruse place a few miles west of the city. Mrs. Stevens, formerly Miss Della Borroway, a sister of Mrs. Geo. Kruse and Mr. Arthur Burroughs, well known residents of this valley, was sent to India by the Seventh Day Adventist Mission board about 19 years ago. A young woman at that time she soon acquired a good knowledge of the language of the province in which she was stationed, and remained there in the work for a long while. About nine years ago she returned to the home land and visited Roseburg relatives at that time. Returning to her post after a year spent in America, she later met Mr. Stevens, also a missionary sent from the Australian union to India. Mr. Stevens has never before visited America, he being a native of Australia. These people have had a wide experience in various parts of India, and speak the language fluently, but the impossible climate of the Orient was undermining the health of Mrs. Stevens, so they were ordered to America by the mission board, coming by way of Vancouver, B. C. They will remain in the vicinity of Roseburg for the present, and may locate here. Both Mr. and Mrs. Stevens are gifted conversationalists, and never fail to deeply interest listeners with their vivid descriptions of life in the Orient among the middle caste people, with whom most of their work was identified.

AGRICULTURE IS IN GOOD CONDITION

(By Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—Agriculture in the middle west is in a better condition financially than indicated by cursory observations of political campaign speeches, Director Eugene Meyer, of the war finance corporation asserted today after a conference with representatives of the corporations from ten states. The farmers are gradually liquidating their debts and the banks in the agricultural sections are gradually improving their position. Steady improvement is shown except in the areas devoted more or less exclusively to wheat.

The couple were married at Vancouver, Wash., in 1912, the complaint filed by Mr. Cummings states. About 15 months ago, it is alleged, Andrews began efforts to alienate the affections of Mrs. Cummings from her husband and succeeded in convincing her that she would be financially better off to leave the plaintiff. It is claimed that the woman did leave her husband and has since been associating with the defendant. Cummings claims that because of the loss of his wife's affections that he has suffered damages in the sum of \$15,000. The couple resided at Reedsport.
