"Call me not Naomi (pleasant), call me Mara (bitter) for the Almighty has dealt very bitterly with me."

Oh, read the book of Ruth if you have an eye for spiritual pearls. All pearls are the result of wounds to the organism developing them. And Naomi was wounded. 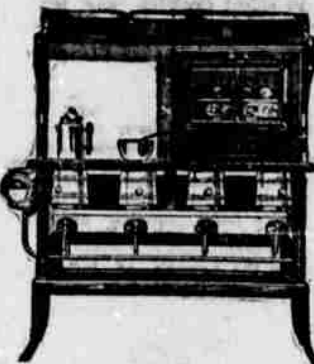

CONTROL OF BORERS

Mr. Cooney, county agent, reports that experience has shown that the flat headed apple tree and peach root borers can be largely controlled by the proper application of a reliable whitewash to the trunks of all prune and peach trees five years of age and younger.

This wash to be effective should be made up and applied by a tested formula. Experiments in the county show that best results come through two applications, the first May 20th

to June 15th and the second, which is by far the most important, August 1st to 10th.

If the growers wish to give their trees a maximum protection from this insect pest, Mr. Cooney strongly advises the August application, and he is prepared to furnish bulletins covering the making and use of this whitewash repellent.
