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HEAT GROWERS MAY
FUTURE LOSS BY HOLDING UP
BIG RESERVE FROM MARKET

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING AND NEW
POLICY IS BEING FORMULATED BY AMERICAN
FARM BUREAU—GOVERNMENT SANCTION
NEEDED—BONDED WAREHOUSE IS
ONE OF THE IDEAS SUGGESTED

EDITOR'S NOTE—Wheat growers hope to prevent in future a recurrence of the recent precipitate drop in price of their product by these devices:
1. To "feed" the wheat to the market as the demand warrants, rather than glutting the market in the first few months following the harvest.
2. To take advantage of government assistance to help them finance their program.

To seek government sanction of a plan to regard the farmer's own storage facilities as "bonded warehouses," and to employ certificates issued for the stored wheat as collateral for loans.
The program is similar in many respects to the successful method now being used by southern cotton growers.
The only possibility of a miscarriage of the program, according to those voiced in some quarters, is that the government will demur at permitting the withdrawal of large quantities of grain from the market to stabilize the price and at the same time finance the crop movement. Government sanction of the proposal to designate the farmer's storage facilities as "bonded warehouses" is another point over which some discussion has arisen.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—Overwhelmed by the downward plunge wheat prices to below the dollar mark in the last few weeks, American wheat growers plan to strike back at the forces of scarcity and seek prevention of a recurrence.

This safeguard, they believe, lies in preventing future glut of the market due to overproduction and the untimely throwing of enormous quantities of grain on the market. This they intend to achieve by withdrawal of approximately 200,000,000 bushels of surplus wheat from the market and storing it on farms, pending to announcement of the American Farm Bureau Federation here.

WOULD USE FARM STORAGE
According to officials of the bureau, the project will involve 1,000,000. This plan will be financed under the new Interstate Commerce act, through which \$660,000,000 is made available to farmers of the country.

The on-farm plan of the bureau will be advanced through the state farm bureaus, county farm bureaus, 20,000 farm units and 1,500,000 individual farmers, in cooperation with the county marketing associations and county banks. The money is estimated at 5 1/2 per cent interest.

World surpluses for the post-war years average only 7,000,000 bushels more than for the average of five pre-war years.

"European wheat importing countries are producing at least 200,000,000 bushels less than before the war."

"In both Europe and the United States there has been a decline in the per capita consumption. This emphasizes the necessity for American agriculture to press to a conclusion a programme of orderly marketing over the crop year. Orderly marketing instead of dumping can turn the wheat crop from the loss which now threatens into a profit."

WHEAT CONFERENCE
HAS BEEN POSTPONED

SPOKANE, Aug. 6.—The Northwest Wheat Conference, scheduled for convening here today, was postponed due to Harding's death. The farmers and union officials said the event would be held later, but the date was not announced. The farmers and state officials were to discuss the low price of wheat and the possibility of either holding the crop for more money or raising the selling price now.

LEO DEVANEY IS
IN MILITARY ESCORT

According to word received today, Leo G. Devaney, local garage man, who is in training at the Reserve Officers' camp at Grimes Field, was selected as a member of the military escort in the funeral procession which took the body of President Harding from the Palace hotel to the train last week. This was quite an honor as only a few reserve officers were chosen for the escort.

The officers of the 9th Corps Area went to the Palace hotel, according to an account of the procession, and formed two lines at the door and the casket was wheeled between the lines with the officers at attention.

U. S. army officials and other notables, who formed the honorary pall bearers walked beside the flag-draped casket. They marched ahead of the hearse to the train, where the officers were drawn up to attention as the casket was carried to the rear car of the train.

Mr. Devaney states that the occasion was a memorable one and that the entire city is in deep mourning over the loss of the chief.

COOLIDGE PLANS
FEW CHANGES

New Organization Will Be in Control, According to Reports Today

ADVISORS AT CAPITOL

Coolidge Takes Personal Command of Plans for Harding Funeral and Makes Final Arrangements Late Today

WASHINGTON, August 6.—President Coolidge apparently has no present intention of calling an extra session of congress but those who called on him today received the impression that he had not made a final decision. Refreshed by a Sunday rest, Coolidge devoted himself today to the plans for the funeral of his late chief. Practically all other official business was put aside.

Constructing Cabinet
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(United Press.)—President Calvin Coolidge quietly began the construction of his "unofficial cabinet." After a conference with his most prominent friends within the republican party, realizing the inevitable necessity for action, Coolidge began the formation of the organization which will aid him in formulating his new policies. William Butler, Massachusetts republican national committeeman is prominently mentioned as a leader of the new Coolidge faction. It is believed that Coolidge will name him attorney general. Frank Stearns, Boston business man, close friend to Coolidge, is already here and will also give him advice.

Confers With President
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—John T. Adams, chairman of the republican national committee, conferred with the president during the day. Political gossipers foresaw a new organization of the control of the republican party.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, chatted with Coolidge 20 minutes on labor questions in general, but the threat of the anthracite coal strike was not mentioned. Gompers said that Coolidge told him his "mind is open" on the question of a special session of congress.

Strain Is Too Great
CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—A constitutional amendment, limiting the presidents of the United States to one term, is urged here by Senator Cummins of Iowa, who declared "the responsibilities and strain of the office is greater than one man can stand."

Final Arrangements Made
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—Final arrangements to receive the remains of Harding were announced this afternoon by President Coolidge, who has taken personal charge of the funeral of his dead chief.

The president will leave the temporary White House about one o'clock accompanied by a military aid, Colonel Sherill, to meet the funeral train, due to arrive at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow.

BOOZE CASE IS
HEARD TODAY

The trial of Clarence Buoy, local S. P. brakeman, charged with the possession of intoxicating liquor, was started this afternoon in the justice court. Buoy's house on South Mill street was searched a few days ago and three bottles of moonshine were found. Officers alleged that they saw a booze delivery made near Kellogg and traced it to Buoy's home. Next morning the residence and the Ed Hartle place near Kellogg were raided simultaneously and portions of a still found at Hartle's. Buoy entered a plea of not guilty and claims that he knew nothing of the presence of the liquor in his home. He was absent on his run to Ashland on the two days preceding and claims that he had no knowledge of the liquor being in the house. A large delegation of the W. O. T. U. women attended the trial. The jury was composed of M. C. Radabaugh, W. S. Powell, G. W. Rapp, J. G. Day, Tom Finley and Charles Wilson. Attorney Neuner appeared for the state and Attorney Abraham for the defense.

WOMAN SENT TO
COUNTY JAIL
COLLEGE OFFICIALS
VISIT IN ROSEBURG

Mr. and Mrs. Dunn of Salem Given Jail Sentence for Carrying Booze

DELIVERY INTERCEPTED

Officers Catch Salem Man and His Wife in Act of Bringing Large Quantity of Moonshine Into City

L. E. Dunn and wife of Salem were arrested late Saturday night charged with the possession of intoxicating liquor, officers confiscating five 1-gallon jugs of moonshine and the Chevrolet car in which the delivery was being made. Dunn, it is alleged, made a previous delivery here on July 3 and at that time fell under suspicion. When the officers saw him in town Saturday afternoon they immediately became suspicious and started to trail him. Sheriff Starmer and Deputy Shambrook trailed him into West Roseburg where he apparently intended to cache his cargo until a sale could be consummated. Near the Soldiers' Home the car was overtaken and the booze removed. Both Mr. and Mrs. Dunn immediately acknowledged their guilt and made no attempt to break away.

They were lodged in the county jail and were arraigned this afternoon. They both entered a plea of guilty to the charge of possessing intoxicating liquor and Mrs. Dunn acknowledged that the car was hers and that she knew of the presence of the liquor, although she claimed she was not assisting in the delivery. She is a very attractive young woman and was very frank in her statements to the court. She goes under the name of Lena May Rogers and her car is licensed under that name. Both she and her husband live at Bridge, she claims, but recently they have been located at Portland and Salem.

They stated that they had nothing to say in extension of their crime. Dunn was fined \$100 and given 30 days in jail and his wife was sentenced to pay a fine of \$200 and spend 15 days in jail.

After hearing sentence passed both thanked the court stating that they knew they could have been given a much heavier sentence and said that they appreciated being let off as lightly as was done. It was possible, they were informed by Judge Jones, to bring a charge of transporting liquor, which would have constituted a felony charge. Steps will also be taken to confiscate the automobile under the new state law.

Mrs. Dunn is the first woman to be confined in the county jail for several years. A cell upstairs is

provided for women, but is not in very good shape. However, Sheriff Starmer said that this cell will be developed for occupancy and Mrs. Dunn will be confined there during the 10 days she is to reside in jail.

HARDING FUNERAL
TRAIN SPEEDS ON

Mrs. Harding Remains Calm, But Is Visibly Aged—Says She Will Not Break Down

CHICAGO PAYS TRIBUTE

City Stops Activities for 45 Minutes as Funeral Train Goes Through City—Purple Asters Drop on Train

ABOARD FUNERAL TRAIN, Boone, Iowa, Aug. 6.—(A. P.)—Since the train entered Iowa this morning it has not passed a single mile where there were not people standing to pay respects.
Thousands came from all parts of Iowa had stationed themselves along the route. Many drove from their farms before daylight. Others remained up all night.

Train Speeding to Capitol.
ABOARD HARDING FUNERAL TRAIN, Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—In an almost unbroken line across the middle west, through which the presidential funeral train sped on its way to the capitol, the American people of this part of the country paid tribute to the passing of their chief. The special bearing all that is mortal of President Harding is racing to make up what little time was lost when the locomotive driving wheel slipped yesterday, delaying the train. The chief concern to those accompanying the president's remains was that Mrs. Harding, wan and visibly aged, may be given strength to carry on to the finish as she has so bravely begun.

Mrs. Harding Calm
ABOARD FUNERAL TRAIN, Cedar Rapids, Ia., Aug. 6.—Mrs. Harding spent a fairly comfortable night. She is courageously calm. She told the women of the party she is determined to go through the funeral ceremonies at Washington and Marion in the calm manner she has maintained since last Thursday. Whether she can do it or not remains to be seen, but those who know her best say she can.

Thousands to Attend
MARION, O., Aug. 6.—(A. P.)—Upwards of 100,000 are expected to throng to the city Friday, during the Harding funeral. Three thousand Ohio reserve troops will be mobilized to guard Harding's property here from souvenir hunters.

Train an Hour Late
NELSON, Ill., Aug. 6.—The Harding funeral train passed through Nelson at 1:42 p. m., an hour late. Thousands lined the tracks to view the train, which slowed down.

Wilson to Participate
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Former president Woodrow Wilson wrote a letter to President Coolidge today stating he "would esteem it an honor to take part in the funeral procession of President Harding. I sincerely grieve, as you do, over the death of Mr. Harding, who had undoubtedly won the esteem of the whole nation by his honorable and conscientious conduct in office," Wilson said.

Chicago Pays Tribute
CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—Business, amusements and other activities will cease 45 minutes this afternoon as the funeral train carrying the body of the late president passes through. Impressive ceremonies will greet the death special.

While thousands line the route, airplanes will fly overhead and drop purple asters as the church bells toll. A salute of 21 guns will be fired by an artillery detachment. The mayor's memorial committee expects to board the train and lay a wreath inscribed "Chicago's sympathy" on the casket.

Friday Public Holiday

OLYMPIA, Aug. 6.—Governor Hart today proclaimed Friday a public holiday, directing the people to assemble in places of divine worship at the hour of burial which is one o'clock Pacific time, for suitable expression of mourning. "Every wheel of industry, every automobile on the highways, every train and all other activities shall cease for five minutes" the proclamation said.

INDIAN WAR VETERAN DEAD

G. B. Riggs, aged 87 years, a veteran of the Indian Wars, died at the home of his son in Eugene, Sunday, according to word received here today. The veteran was a resident of the Soldiers' Home, and left a few days ago on a furlough to visit with his son. He leaves his son, Morris Riggs, and a daughter, Marion Riggs, at Eugene. The body will be taken to Dallas where burial will take place. J. L. Scott, of Roseburg, a nephew, left this afternoon to attend the funeral services.

Fined For Speeding—

O. M. Root, a tourist, was fined \$25 and costs today by Justice of the Peace George Jones, after a plea of guilty was entered to a charge of speeding. The complaint was filed by Traffic Officer Thurber.
