CONSIGNMENT PLAN BROCCOLI WANTED

It is understood that efforts are being made in the county by some of the larger commission houses to put the broccoli industry in this county back upon the old consignment selling basis, instead of on the cash plan as has been in use here during the past two years. A number of growers have been solicited, it is stated, and a few are reported to have agreed to sell on consignment next season, and it is expected that there will be quite a fight between the houses buying in this manner and the local exchanges which will demand cash.

Under the cash basis the grower is paid for his crop without loss of time and the crop is accepted on the tracks at Roseburg and any shipping loss must be sustained by the purchaser. On the other hand the consignment plan holds up the grower's money until the crop has been sold on the market, and in the event of loss in transit the grower is the one who loses.

Considerable work has been done to establish a cash market which, however, is not approved by some of the big buyers, who, naturally, would rather buy on the consignment plan.

WILL OBSERVE CONSTITUTION WEEK

Hon. O. P. Coshaw has been appointed by the American Bar Association to take charge of that organization's efforts in this locality in making Constitution Week, September 16 to 22, a success. There is at the present time so much lawlessness and disrespect for law throughout the nation, that the American Bar Association is endeavoring to outline a plan which will in some measure call attention back to the fundamental principles upon which the government is founded and endeavor to restore respect for the constitution and create a higher feeling and regard for the laws of the country. It is stated that there are over a million and a half radicals of varying degrees of communism in the country, all seeking to overthrow the existing government and put in its place some "red" form of government control. Over \$3,000,000 was spent in the United States during the past year for the circulation of Red propaganda.

Attorney Coshaw, who is a member of the citizenship committee of the American Bar Association, will endeavor to bring about a general observance of the week here and has written letters to all of the ministers of the city asking them to preach special sermons on the subject, and has also requested the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce, G. A. R., American Legion and other organizations of a fraternal and patriotic nature.

DODGE BROTHERS PLAN LARGER PRODUCTION

New Buildings Greatly Increasing Present Capacity Almost Completed.

Expansion Program Will Cost \$5,000,000; New Closed Car Building Erected in Record Time.

An immense new assembly building, duplicating the present structure in size, is announced by Dodge Brothers as the principal unit of the 1923 expansion program.

The building is six stories high, 1,000 feet long and 75 feet wide, with more than one-half million square feet of floor space. Construction work which started some months ago is now nearly completed. The new assembly building, paralleling the old structure, is just across the street, which formerly marked the boundary line of the great Dodge Brothers factories.

Factory executives would not comment on the number of additional cars contemplated in this extensive addition, but it is believed that the immediate aim is a capacity of 1,900 cars a day. In the face of the greatly overcast conditions which prevailed throughout the entire year just past, it is not unreasonable to assume that this number mentioned could be absorbed easily by Dodge Brothers dealers.

Other units of the expansion program are the new cyanide building, a million dollar addition to the power house, and a mammoth new closed body building. The latter is completed several floors having been occupied for some time. It is estimated that the total investment represented by these additions, in buildings alone, will reach \$5,000,000.

The erection of the body building in the short space of four months established a record. Considering the fact that it is an eight story building 400 x 200 feet in dimension, with a total floor space of 500,000 square feet, the time is exceptionally short. It is a striking tribute to the efficiency and financial independence of Dodge Brothers, as all the work was done under the supervision of the factory's own construction department.

Some idea of the magnitude of the undertaking may be gleaned from the fact that 20,000 barrels of cement and 16,000 cubic yards of concrete were used in the building, as well as 4,000 tons of construction steel, 1,164 tons of reinforcing steel, 25,000 window lights, 500,000 feet of maple flooring, and 600,000 bricks. There are seven traveling cranes ranging from five tons to twenty tons in capacity, and four 10-ton high speed elevators, capable of traveling 400 feet a minute. The building is heated by the indirect system fans forcing the washed air down various ducts after it is heated by steam pipes on the roof. Fire protection is insured by 10,000 sprinkler heads. All stairways are safety treaded.

While this unit is an enormous building in itself, it is in reality only half a building. The other half was completed two years ago. Taken as a whole, the building is one of the largest single factory units in the world, with a floor area of a million square feet. It will be devoted entirely to the production of all steel bodies—a type of construction originated by and for Dodge Brothers.

FISHERIES OUTPUT WORTH 19 MILLIONS

(By Associated Press.)
VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 6.—British Columbia's salmon pack totaled 1,299,960 cases in 1922 valued at \$10,199,927. This was an increase of 657,293 cases over the 1921 output and a gain in value of \$4,175,983, according to a report compiled by the provincial department of mines and fisheries.

The total value of the output of British Columbia fisheries during the year, including fresh, canned, cured or otherwise prepared, the report shows, was \$18,872,832. This was an increase over the previous year of \$4,919,163, or 26 per cent.

An interesting feature of the report was the fact that whaling operations which were suspended in 1921 were resumed in 1922 and produced an output valued at \$165,814. Total capital invested in the fish industry of British Columbia, the report shows, was \$19,951,571. Of this \$6,756,827 represented vessels, nets, traps, piers and wharves and \$13,194,744 represented money invested in canning and curing establishments. The number of persons engaged in fishing operations and in canning and curing establishments, it is shown, was 14,930.
