DAMAGE CAUSED BY HUGE BLAST

Rock Crusher at Olalla Destroyed and Adamak Home Is Razed

FORCE GOES THRU SEAM

Clay Fissure Opens Up and Directs Force of Explosion on Rock Crushing Plant and Nearby House

The Camas mountain section of the Roseburg-Camas highway may be closed again next winter as a result of a misdirected blast at the rock quarry at Olalla Saturday evening. The blast caused damage amounting to more than \$10,000 and will probably delay the work of graveling the Camas mountain and Camas Valley sections of the new road by at least one month. The home of Frank Adamak in Olalla was completely demolished, his orchard destroyed, and some of his hens and chickens killed.

The damage was due to an unexpected clay fissure in the rock formation which was being blasted. The powder was well placed but when the blast was touched off it opened up the fissure which had not been previously located and the force of the explosion was driven in another direction, hurling dirt and rocks in the direction of the Adamak house, formerly the old Newland place.

The blast occurred at the rock quarry located at the junction of the Olalla and the Ten Mile roads. It is being used to obtain rock for surfacing the Camas mountain and Camas Valley sections of the Roseburg-Camas highway. The contract being handled by the National Surety company, which took over the work when the contractor, W. C. Stone, failed to meet the requirements. The workmen have been engaged for some time in preparing for the blast which was expected to bring down a large quantity of rock to complete the work. The formation is clay and gravel type, and in drilling the formation was found to be quite hard. In spite of a careful survey the clay seam was not found as it was

BALL TEAM ENDS SEASON

The Roseburg baseball team has officially ended its season and is now winding up its affairs. The team decided to withdraw from the Upper Willamette Valley league when the gate receipts at the other towns fell so low that the local team was forced to stand a financial loss on every trip away from home. While the team was visiting Roseburg were met by a large crowd and liberal gate. Owing to the fact that the Coos County league has only three more games it was not thought worth while to enter that league for the few games that would be played. The team ends the season in good shape and is grateful for the support given by the local ball fans.

The tunnel was loaded with almost 9,000 pounds of powder and was touched off late Saturday evening. The force of the explosion went into the seam and blew off the big rock and drove dirt and rocks through the fissure. It was like a giant cannon and debris was scattered over a great territory. The blast brought down over 8,000 yards of rock which can be used, but would have been much more effective except for the fault in the rock.

Large boulders weighing from four to six tons were hurled against the Adamak house about 100 yards away. Rocks buried through the orchard broke down trees and knocked off all of the fruit. Several hens and chickens were killed.

The crushing plant was completely demolished. The two crushers were torn down and the big bunker rased. A Fordson tractor and the 75-horsepower engine operating the compressor was damaged. The total loss is estimated at more than \$10,000 damage.

It was announced today that work will start at once in rebuilding the plant. The first task will be to get the compressor working again so that the plant can be put in operation at once and as little time as possible lost on the contract. At least, however, the work of graveling the Camas mountain and Camas Valley sections will be delayed by at least one month, and unless the contractors have the best of luck it is very doubtful if the work can be finished before the rains set in. Every effort is to be made, however, to get the work done in time to enable the state to keep the road open during the coming winter.
