LIGHTING SYSTEM

FIXTURES COMING

Harold Hudson of Hudson's Electric store, who has the contract for the new \$11,000 electric street lighting system to be installed in this city, has been notified that the new poles are being shipped on August 15 and that the cable will leave the South Bend factory on September 1. Engineer C. L. Canfield who aided the city in preparing plans and specifications for the local system, is giving the local project his personal attention and recently made a trip to South Bend where he took up the matter of prompt shipment of materials to Roseburg. As a result of his work the equipment for the local system is being sent ahead of orders sent in by other municipalities which allowed contracts prior to Roseburg. Latest reports show that this city allowed its lighting contract just in time, as materials have increased 25 per cent since the time the contract was let. Installation will require about 30 days.
