Zippy and Pithy News Gleaned on the Pacific Coast

(By United Press.)
CATALINA ISLAND, Cal., Aug. 8.—When competition among restaurant proprietors at Avalon was keen and barkers were permitted, one of them assuming a dramatic attitude, praised loudly the advantages of his establishment and concluded:
"The Klondike—the only restaurant in California with a big tree growing through the center of the dining room."

A silence followed, and the crowd headed towards the Klondike. Then a rival barker across the street piped up:

"Ladies and gentlemen: There's a reason why we don't have any big trees. We don't have enough dirt in our dining room to grow one."

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 8.—Claiming a record of 12 big Alaskan brown bears, Campbell Church of Eugene, and Edson Marshall, Medford author, have returned from a successful hunting expedition which took them far into the woods of the Alaskan peninsula.

The sportsmen were gone two months, making the trip via steamer to Ithaca, Unimak Island, on the extreme end of the peninsula, and from there by smaller boat and canoe into the headwaters of an unnamed river, from which point they "packed in" for three days to the hunting ground which they had selected.

All of the bears were secured at high elevations, from 8,000 to 19,000 feet above the timberline. The region is volcanic and Church reported smoke issuing from many craters of the region visited.

Five of the huge grizzlies have been given to the University of Oregon here as a nucleus for a museum of natural history, and will be mounted under glass.

BEND, Or., Aug. 8.—Another marathon record has been shattered by a local contestant.

Ronald Sellers, local soda fountain patron, has consumed seven and one-half full-sized pine nut sandwiches at a local sweet shop in one sitting, and claims that will stand as a record for a long time.

Franklin Toomey, another confectionery customer, put down six milk shakes without a halt, and contends that sets a new mark for liquid consumption.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 8.—Washington prunes will take the place of southern molasses as a flavoring for chewing tobacco in at least one big cut plug plant.

One car of prunes has already been shipped for this purpose, with 25 more to follow. After extensive tests, the prune juice flavor is said to give the leaf a delicate taste all its own, which is expected to popularize "squirtin" tobacco more than ever.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Aug. 8.—That dread disease of stars of filmdom, Kleig eyes, is also communicable to dog stars, it was revealed here recently when "Pal," featured canine player in "Spring Music," fell a victim to the powerful studio lights after appearing in several close-ups. The dog's eyes had to be bandaged for several days.

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Aug. 8.—Frederick Sieg, millionaire, applied to the police here for food and shelter recently. He had a million German marks in his possession when he deserted the German steamer Eochum here in hopes of earning fabulous sums as a longshoreman. His funds, when converted into dollars, soon gave out and he was turned over to immigration officers.

LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 8.—When Governor Friend W. Richardson dined with him here, Judge Ralph Cook hired a special watchman to keep away suspicious characters. Later in the evening a suspicious character lurking near the judge's mansion, took him to the police station. The dinner over, the judge and governor started a hunt for their guard. They found him guarded at the city jail, charged with carrying concealed weapons.

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—Bootleggers have decreased in numbers during the past year, but the ones still in business have been making greater profits.

Those facts are revealed in the annual report of the United States attorney's office, recently announced.

Despite the fact that sentences have been increasing, with 5500 fines spoken by the judge in most instances, there have been few convicted violators during the past year unable to pay the sums imposed. In 1922, the records show, many booze law breakers took the paper's oath to escape payment of fines.

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 8.—Harry Leas, 21, has filed suit in the courts here for annulment of an unusual wedding in which he was the leading figure—the groom. He says the ceremony was performed under a state law of California, which is little known of, that a couple who have lived together as man and wife can be married by a minister without a license.

Leas was married under this law, but declares he was under age, being but 20 at the time, and so the wedding was illegal, as he did not have his parents' consent.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 8.—Sheriff's deputies are displaying a new style in booze containers, presumably used by some local dry law violator in dispensing refreshments.

St. Dominic's church is the structure to be rebuilt. A \$500,000 building has been started and will be one of the most magnificent edifices in the city. The building is of Gothic style architecture.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 8.—Do you want a buffalo for a household pet or a playmate for the children?

According to Smith Riley, head of the bird and animal reservation department of the United States, who has been here for several days, the government would like to dispose of about 400 buffalo on the Bison range of Montana. The animals are increasing so rapidly the food capacity of the range is being depleted, Riley said.

DEPUTY FIRE MARSHAL HERE

James S. Gleason, deputy state fire marshal, spent the day in Roseburg, checking up on fire hazards here. He is well pleased with the way local hotels have carried out the recommendations of the state fire marshal in providing fire escapes. A number of the buildings in the business district were condemned by the fire marshal's office some time ago, as fire hazards, but nothing has been done by the city to force their removal. This matter will be taken up with the city fire commissioners. An effort will also be made to force the cleaning up of lots in the rear of some of the business houses. Failure to comply with the rules of the state fire marshal throw the property open for a penalty and also allows him to be sued for damages in the event his failure causes loss to any other person.
